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Parties are Ove The Hardeman County Commis-

sion voted Tuesday night to send a private act to the State of Tennessee to eliminate partisan political races in county elections. Citing a possible savings of

\$30,000 for the county and the already non-partisan attitude of the commissioners, county mayor Jimmy Sain presented the act to the commission, where it was eventually approved by a 11-4 margin.

The act now goes to the state legislature. If approved, it will come back to the county commission, where it will take another two-thirds majority vote to make it into law.

County mayor Jimmy Sain, who

says a majority of elected officials asked for the measure to come before the commission, was pleased with getting a two-thirds majority to pass the act.

"Last night, the commission made a huge step in taking away the labels we have had to endure on a local level, for years. Our well-meaning commissioners do not serve a political party from Washington D.C., instead they serve the people of Hardeman County," said Sain.

"There is never a decision from the county mayor's office based on political affiliation. Every citizen is treated the same. I make decisions based on biblical beliefs, not polit-

"All of our municipalities are non-partisan, as is the board of education board members. We want to do the same for the county offices."

Sain's enthusiasm for passage was not shared by the Hardeman County Democratic Party Chairman Randall Rice.

"A travesty of justice occurred tonight at the Hardeman County Board of Commissioners meeting. A resolution was passed that would eliminate county primary elections if ultimately approved," said Rice.

"Our two-party system has served us well for almost 250 years and should not be ended on the whim of a single night's vote without all sides being considered or even heard. That is what happened tonight. Several inaccurate statements were given to the commissioners as fact," he added, although he did not elaborate.

While debate was heard on both sides of the issue from the commissioners and also from a member of the Youth Commission that was present for the meeting (see B2 Sports for news from the Youth Commission), Rice said he felt like more people should have had the chance to speak.

"When I asked to address the issue, I was denied by the mayor. After the mayor specifically requested to hear from a young commissioner, I again asked to speak if other people who are not

commissioners were to be heard. Again, I was denied. This is wrong, that the mayor and board of commissioners vote to cancel the citizens right to vote in a primary election and won't even hear from the Chair of the Hardeman County Democratic Party," he added.

Voting against the measure were Elvis White, Major Wilburn, Vinscen Morrow, and Anthony Pulse. All four ran for commission as democrats in 2014, as did Jackie Sain, Mike Madden, Jim Daniel, Bobby Doyle, and Elmer Cobb, who all voted in favor of the act.

Chandra Lake was absent from the meeting due to the death of her mother.

Sain said during the meeting that many counties have non-partisan county elections. These include Fayette, Chester, and Haywood Counties, according to Hardeman County Administrator of Elections Amber Moore.

It is believed, if passed, Hardeman County would be the first in the State of Tennessee to do it by private act. The other counties that have non-partisan county elections do it by an agreement reached between the political parties.

Knight Tabbed to Replace Ross

The Hardeman County Commission unanimously voted on Tuesday night to have Matt Knight replace Tony Ross as a Hardeman County Road Supervisor. Knight will serve until August, when the position will be on the county general election ballot.

The opening created with the resignation of Hardeman County District 3 Road Supervisor Ross has attracted two candidates, Knight, who ran unsucessfully against Ross in 2014, and Jared L. King.

Ebenezer School to Host Open House



A group in Hardeman County is keeping a more-than-century old school's memory alive in Hardeman County.

The Ebenezer School came into existence on January 10, 1896. Two private citizens Mr. and Mrs. Hooper gave it (there is no mention of any money being exchanged) to the Public School Directors.

The next known information about the school is a picture of the group of students in front of the building in 1913. According to the committee, the photo includes many familiar names from the community then and now. An earlier building was destroyed by fire. There was also a school in the church building located a short distance away from the existing church building, which burned also.

The present building was built in 1937 according to several documents from The Board of Education "End of school year lists of property". The last dates of these are for school year 1948 and 1949. The school closed in 1950.

In 1984 a Reunion was held at the building. It was well attended by former teachers, students, and citizens of the commu-

The minutes of the Hardeman County Court Clerk state that in 1991 the Hardeman County Board of Education "motion by Don Pulse and seconded by Gene Howell, transfered the Ebenezer School Property to Ebenezer Baptist Church for \$1.00."

According to Joe Martin, former superintendent of schools, the building belonged to the community as was represented by the church nearby. On April 27, 1991, it was deeded to the deacons of the church.

In 2007, a group composed of former students and interested persons in the community decided the old building needed some "tender loving care". They started to clean out the building and found it to be in amazingly good condition having well preserved wood throughout. The group has worked on and off since that time. Last year Jerry Vales decided it needed painting and started to work. With some help, the painting is complete but the committee could use help in bringing the project to the point it deserves.


A sign was presented by The Hardeman County Board of Education and their support is appreciated.


Additionally Mark Williams, a community member with no previous connection to the school graciously donated his talent in painting the roof.

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
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

Unemployment Dips Again in Tennessee

Tennessee Labor & Workforce Development Commissioner Burns Phillips announced the Tennessee preliminary unemployment rate for March was 4.5 percent, four-tenths of a percentage point decrease from the February revised rate of 4.9 percent. The U.S. preliminary rate for March was 5.0 percent, increasing one-tenth of a percentage point from the previous month.

Over the past year, Tennessee's unemployment rate decreased from 6.0 percent to 4.5 percent while the national rate declined from 5.5 percent to 5.0 percent.

Total nonfarm employment decreased 700 jobs from February to March. The largest decreases occurred in government, leisure/hospitality, administrative/support/waste services & mining/logging/construction. Over the year, nonfarm employment increased 91,800 jobs. The largest increases occurred in trade/

transportation/utilities, education/health services & professional/business services. County-by-county figures for March will be available later this month.

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
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
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

Saturday nights in Kemah, Texas are marked by loud, classic and flashy cars. This past week I saw everything from a classic '57 Chevy to a row of a dozen corvettes. There were even a couple of Lamborghinis parked side by side. If you like cars at all, it's an impressive showing. I was not there to see the show, however. I needed to grab a couple of things at the market while waiting to pick up my daughters. After taking a look around, I drove off to the other end of the parking lot and noticed another car with it's hood up. The '97 Ford Escort had really put the miles in, and the car looked well-used. Inside, a woman with pink hair sat next to a guy in sunglasses who appeared to be sleeping.

"You guys ok?" I always ask when someone has a hood up and nobody seems to be working on anything.

"I don't know what is wrong with it." The lady was personable as the guy stayed sleeping or drifting in thought in the hot sun. She described what she heard and gave some helpful clues.

I looked the car over, complete with an engine covered entirely in oil. In all, I took about an hour to look it over, diagnose it and let her know what steps she needed to do next. They weren't expensive or difficult. I gave her a quart of oil I had in my trunk and bought another one at the nearby store. I then told her where the auto parts was located. It was only a mile or so away. This would easily get her there. By the time I had wrapped up, her bishop had responded to a phone call and pulled up next to her.



Sunrise: CIPD by David Cov

There are, as you know, many ways in which you and I may experience sorrow and then begin our walk with grief. All of us come to know what it is like to lose someone by death. It is heart wrenching because we make investment in their life and they in ours. Some people may know other forms of sorrow that most of us will never know. There is an acquired immune-mediated inflammatory disorder of the peripheral nervous system, identified as CIDP. Chronic inflammatory demyelinating polyneuropathy sometimes called chronic relapsing polyneropathy (CRP) or chronic inflammatory demyelinating polyradiculoneuropathy (because it involves the nerve roots. It is closely related to Guillain-Barre syndrome and is considered the chronic counterpart to that acute disease. It is believed to be caused by the immunes cells incorrectly attacking the nerves in the body instead of protecting the body from foreign infection. (en.m.wikipedia.org)

Enter a 25 year old man named Yamaguchi Hayato who learns he has a rare illness which affects the nervous system. He loses the normal and functional use of his arms and legs, hands and feet, resulted by the affected nerves failing to respond. They begin to cause numbing, tingling, pain, progressive muscle weakness, loss of deep tendon reflexes (areflexia), fatigue, and abnormal sensations. As this is a chronic disease it is likely that it will progress. I understand there is no universal agreed criteria for diagnosing CIDP, thus a majority of people who suffer with these above symptoms are misdiagnosed. Thus they are often left untreated despite progression of the disease. (Latov N 2002. Diagnosis of CIDP, Neurology 59).

Grief may be produced by ways unimagined by most of us throughout the world. We all need to be supportive of our neighbors as we may not know what they are enduring. 
BILLY GENE COX

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





Carrot Cheesecake

Ingredients

1 package carrot cake mix

6 eggs

1/2 cup raisins 3 ounces cream cheese, softened

1 cup water 1/2 cup cooking oil

1 1/2 cups granulated sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla Nonstick cooking spray

2 tablespoons powdered sugar 1 tablespoon water

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 cup coarsely chopped walnuts

1 cup powdered sugar 3 teaspoons milk

Directions Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Grease and flour 10-inch springform pan; set aside. In large bowl

combine carrot cake mix, 1 cup water, oil, and 3 of the eggs. Beat with an electric mixer on low speed for 30 seconds, scraping sides of bowl constantly. Beat on medium speed for 3 minutes. Fold in raisins. Pour into pan. In another large bowl beat cream cheese with an electric mixer on medium speed until smooth.

Beat in granulated sugar and vanilla until smooth. Beat in remaining 3 eggs just until combined. Slowly pour over carrot cake layer. Place cheesecake on baking sheet. Bake for 1-1/2 to 1-3/4 hours or until center is set (top will be uneven and center may fall slightly

as it cools). Cool in pan on wire rack for 15 minutes. Using small sharp knife, loosen the cake from the sides of the pan. Cool 30 minutes. Remove sides of pan; cool completely, and refrigerate at least 4 hours before serving.

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Line a small baking pan with foil; lightly coat foil with cooking spray. In small bowl combine 2 tablespoons powdered sugar, 1 tablespoon water, and cinnamon. Stir in walnuts. Spread nuts in even layer in prepared baking pan. Bake 8 minutes or until nuts are lightly toasted, stirring once. Cool.

In medium bowl combine 1 cup powdered sugar and enough milk to make of drizzling consistency. Cut cheesecake into wedges and place each wedge on serving plate. Drizzle each serving with some of the powdered sugar icing. Break up walnuts and place atop cheesecake wedges. Makes 16 servings.

The location for the junction was selected when the town of LaGrange did not wish to have two railroad crossings in its town, and Grand Junction became forever linked with the trains.

The town and its access to two rail lines became important to both sides during the Civil War. The junction gave north-south and eastwest access to whichever army controlled them, giving them greater access to the entire Western Theater. Many skirmishes were fought in and around the area as control of the rail lines went back and forth, with ultimate control won by the Union Army. General U.S. Grant appointed Chaplain John Eaton Jr. (27th Ohio Volunteers) to organize and care for the refugees who had come to the Union camps in the Grand Junction area. Grand Junction's contraband camp was one of the largest, providing a safe haven and a new start for thousands of people. To learn more about the fascinating history of the contraband camps, visit the Corinth Interpretive Center in Corinth, Mississippi – their displays and information tell the story of how these camps equipped the former slaves for their new lives as free men and women. It is one of the most interesting, and lesser known, facts of the war.

By the late 1890's trains on the Illinois Central lines made their way through Grand Junction, winding their way across the Tennessee and Mississippi country sides. A young man named Thomas Edison worked his way across the rail lines at a very early age, making stops in Grand Junction and Bolivar as a telegraph operator. Another telegraph operator in the early 20th century gives me a connection to Grand Junction and its railroad history; my paternal great-grandfather, Albert Luke Lanier, was a telegraph operator




for the railroads and lived in Grand Junction for a time. I always knew liking trains had to be in my blood, and so it is.

The trains are still active in Grand Junction, and it is a magnificent sound to hear that far-away horn and then the rumble and rattle of the train and the rails as it passes through town. This photo shows one of the old steam engine trains passing through town, when the billowing smoke from the smoke stack

added to the symphony of the rails. (If you ever have the chance to ride in an old steam-engine train, do not turn down the opportunity. It is a marvelous way to travel.)

Stop by some time and visit Grand Junction; visit the National Bird Dog Museum; and then go eat some good Southern cookin's served to you by friendly folks. And when the train goes through town, y'all be sure to wave at the engineer.
