As we prepared to broadcast the Bolivar Dizzy Dean 6U Baseball Consolation Championship at Snowden Grove in Southaven, MS on a Tuesday morning this past summer, we looked around. The stands were packed. With Bolivar fans. And some of them had been there since Saturday.

We were playing Southaven American, the "home team" but we had twice as many fans as they did. It's a fact for us that no matter where we go, we always seem to look like the home team.

We had tents, chairs, fans dressed in uniform shirts, and even fans with green face paint. Parents, grandparents, little brothers and sisters, aunts, uncles, friends and neighbors all came to root our

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County Votes Red for President

Story of the Year

For the first time since 1988, Hardeman County Voters picked the Republican candidate for president, choosing President-Elect Donald Trump over Hillary Clinton by a 54% to 44%

Libertarian Gary Johnson with 1%. The margin of victory (4,919-4,185) also smashed the previous win margin by a Republican candidate. In 1988, President Elect George H.W. Bush beat Michael Dukakis by

margin. Other candidates made up the remaining 2%, led by

only 121 votes. Voters in eight precincts in Hardeman County chose Trump (led by Pocahontas at 92%) while the other five chose Clinton, led by Grand Junction at 75%.

A total of 146 voters went to the polls, but did not vote for a presidential candidate, led by Hornsby, who saw 2.87% not make a presidential choice.

From 1980 to 2012, with only 1988 as an exception, the Democratic candidate for president carried Hardeman County, usually by a comfortable margin.

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

June 23 - Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain asked the Hardeman County Commission during their neeting on June 21 if they knew who owned the Hardeman County Criminal Justice Center. Turns out, nobody knew and according to Sain it has cost the county plenty. Sain promised the commission to come back with a full report at a later meeting.

> > **July 14** – Bolivar Fire Chief Lynn Price (see photo left) was named the 2016 Fire Chief of the Year by the Tennessee Fire Chiefs Association during the opening ceremonies of the 43rd annual conference of the association.

> > July 21 - Citing "strong budgetary performance" and "very strong liquidity" Standard and Poor Global Ratings assigned its A+ long term rating to Hardeman County's series 2016 general obligation bonds. Previously, the rating was A-.

Hardeman County School Board Mem-

ber Jerry McCord tendered his resignation to Hardeman County School Superintendent Warner Ross, due to his change of residence out of District 2 that he had served since 1998.

The Tennessee Historical Commission awarded Hardeman County one of 31 grants from the Federal Historic Preservation Fund to community and civic organizations for projects that support the preservation of historic and archaeological resources.

July 28 - Hardeman County's Lone Oaks Farm announced the Tennessee Wildlife Resource's Agency (TWRA) will donate \$2.6 million for the first phase of a shooting range.

Hardeman County's upgrade from A- to A+ on bond ratings gave the county an immediate boost in the fund balance as a refinance at 2.18% of a part of the debt on the Hardeman County Criminal Justice Center complex and will save more than \$1.6 million over the life of the loan. This will also help to push the fund balance to the \$3 million goal.

Tennessee State Representative Johnny Shaw was named Tennessee Forestry Association's (TFA) 2016 Legislator of the Year.

August 4 – Statewide support for the Hatchie River Park and Museum continued in late July as Tennessee Governor Bill Haslam and Economic and Community Development Commissioner Randy Boyd announced that Bolivar would be among 29 communities in Tennessee to receive a Tourism Enhancement Grant worth \$50,000. The money will be spent

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Bulletin Times Becomes Locally Owned

The County Journal, the weekly newspaper of Hardeman County, finalized a purchase of the assets of the Bolivar Bulletin Times on March 16, bringing local ownership to the publication for the first time since 1974.

The County Journal, Inc., which began in January of 2010, ceased publication under their banner on March 17 and switched to the Bolivar Bulletin Times banner beginning Thursday, March 24.

Lewis Floyd, Senior Associate with W.B. Grimes & Company represented the seller in this transaction. Providing the financing for the project were Merchants and Planters Bank and Centennial Bank. The first newspaper in Hardeman County appeared in 1829 and was

called the Bolivar Palladium. Others that followed were the Bolivar Herald; the Sentinel in 1839; the Bolivar Free Press and Farmer's Herald, which was edited in 1835 by James B. Walker; and the West Tennessee Democrat, which was founded in 1845 by John J. Neely. This publication continued until the Civil War. All of these were the forerunners of the Bolivar Bulletin-Times. In 1865, the Bolivar Bulletin was founded by Moses R. Parrish, who

was the editor until 1874, when it was managed and published by several owners. The name was changed briefly to the West Tennessee Star. A competitor for the weekly from 1895-1918 was The Hardeman Free *Press*, which was operated by J.R. Reaves.

R.H. Green and Hugh Williams bought the publication in 1888 and the name was changed to the Bolivar Bulletin. In 1946, Alan and Estelle Sexton purchased the weekly journal and combined it with the Hardeman County Times, which they had bought in 1940 from Bert Hodge, who established it in 1936.

In September 1974, the Sextons sold the newspaper to Delphos Herald, Inc. of Delphos, Ohio, who sold it to The County Journal, Inc. in March.

The newspaper operates from 200 E. Market Street, Suite B, in Bolivar. The Bulletin Times Building at 410 W. Market Street was sold to a third party.

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
MOTHER ETHEL EW PIRTLE



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

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When You Retire, Where Can You Find Investment Income?

As an investor, your main goals will change at different times in your life. During your working years, you need to grow as many resources as possible for retirement. Once you retire, however, you will likely need to focus more on getting income from your investments. But what are your options?

There's no shortage of income-producing investments, of course. You might immediately think of bonds, which can provide regular interest payments and probable preservation of principal, provided the bonds are considered "investment grade." Still, if interest rates are low when you retire – as they have been for several years now – bonds might not provide you with as much income as you need. And just as importantly, the income you receive from most bonds won't rise over time, leaving you susceptible to inflation and the loss of

Consequently, you may also need to explore other types of income-generating vehicles, including dividend-paying stocks and real estate investment trusts (REITs).

Some stocks have not only paid but also increased their dividends for many consecutive years. These stocks have historically provided the potential for rising income to help combat inflation and are typically well-run companies that strive to reward their investors. Nonetheless, you need to recognize that even these stocks are not obligated to pay you dividends, and they are free to lower or discontinue them at any time without notice.

Now, let's turn to a second type of potential income-producing asset: Real estate investment trusts (REITs).

Different types of REITs are available. For example, equity REITs invest in and own commercial properties, such as hotels and shopping centers, while mortgage REITs, as the name suggests, own and invest in property mortgages. Is one form of REIT better than another? There's no simple answer. On the one hand, mortgage REITs are considered riskier than equity REITs. However, mortgage REITs often pay quite large dividends, although the payout can be inconsistent. (Like all REITs, mortgage REITs must pay 90% of their taxable income to investors in the form of dividends. Due to this requirement, REITs generally need to raise capital to finance their growth plans, and this necessity can affect their share prices.)

Other factors, such as changing interest rates, will affect the value of mortgage and equity REITs differently. Specifically, rising interest rates will likely cause the market value of the property mortgages inside mortgage REITs to fall, whereas equity REITs, which own actual buildings, might actually benefit if the Federal Reserve raises interest rates, as such a move would indicate a strong economy, more jobs and greater demand for office space. In the short term, though, even equity REITs can react negatively to an interest-rate increase. But over the long term, this movement can be offset by the benefits of earnings and dividend growth driven by a growing economy.

Clearly, there's much to think about when considering potential income-producing options such as bonds, dividend-paying stocks and REITs. Ultimately, you will need to weigh the merits and risks of these investments – including interest rate risk, credit risk and market risk – and determine which of them, or which combination of them, are most appropriate for your needs.

The Hardeman County Commission will have a new face as Johnny Weems won the District 2, Position 2 race, beating Gary Barber and Win-

The other county commission spot up for grabs was already in the hands of incumbent Connie Young, who ran unopposed for the District

Voters in five precincts selected Matt Knight as the District 3 Road Supervisor. Knight won four of the five precincts, losing only in Whiteville by a 109-107 margin.

The Hardeman County School Board re-elected three incumbents, as Beverly A. Bodiford, District 2, Position 2) Jerry Crisp, District 3, Position 1, and Terry King, District 3, Position 3, ran unopposed.

The Town of Whiteville sent three incumbents back to city hall as William Charles Phillips (127 votes), Emily Moore Rosson (124 votes) and Tommy L. Turner (193 votes) all reclaimed their spots over challengers Dorinda

Keeling (51 votes) and Susan G. Melton-Piper (62 votes). Randy Hill, Hardeman County Schools Maintenance Supervisor, was the recipient of the Tennessee

A Story to Follow in 2017

When the Hardeman County Commission voted April 12 to send a private act to the State of Tennessee to eliminate partisan political races in county elections, State Representative Johnny Shaw wished someone had told him of their plans.

"I'm not against it," he said. "Just how they did it."

Shaw's issue was that Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain sent the private act to Nashville through Republican Senator Dolores Gresham, who managed to get it through the Senate, but it arrived at the House of Representatives too late for passage due to adjournment of the body for the year. Gresham asked house member and republican Jamie Jenkins, who represents Hardeman County in the southernmost part of the county, to co-sponsor the bill instead of Shaw.

"If it is going to be non-partisan, why only call republicans about it?" he asked, pointing out that he represents more than 90% of the citizens of the county. "We [meaning he and Gresham] would have been perfect to get this passed."

As it turned out, it was too late, as a needed third reading was not scheduled before the Local Government Committee of the Tennessee House adjourned.

"If it comes up in January, I will pass this," Shaw said at the time. "But I hope that the county commission will ask their constituents what they

It's not the first private act the county commission has sent to Nashville recently. Last year, the proposed landfill fee private act (which would put landfill fees on property tax bills) was sent to Shaw, who saw it passed by both houses and it will come back to the commission for vote in the coming months.

Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain said it wasn't his intention to 'go around" Representative Shaw.

"I had been talking to Senator Gresham on several key points of legislation for the county," he said. "And I told her about this. She said to send it to her. It was her decision who she got to co-sponsor. We never talked about it."

Sain says the republican controlled senate and house probably played into who was brought to co-sponsor the bill.

"I have no idea why Senator Gresham chose Representative Jenkins, but I think if you want to get something passed right now in Nashville, you would use a republican, would you not? But it never crossed my mind who she would get."

"I'm 100% sure this will pass the legislature in January," said Sain.

If passed, it will come back to the county commission, requiring a two-thirds majority to pass it into law. Sain welcomes the debate that could occur.

"I've had countless numbers of people contact me and say this is the best thing that has happened to county government in a long time," he said, adding that the Republican Party contacted him and gave their full

"It's a good thing. It's the thing we need to do. We need support from Nashville, and it shouldn't matter what party we are from. I was elected as a democratic mayor and I'm trying to get support from a majority republican house and majority republican senate and a republican governor, and it really shouldn't make a difference. None of our decisions are based on party affiliation," he explained. "This is the biggest reason we need to do this."

Sain also maintained the Democratic Party in Hardeman County has failed in the election process as well.

"I ran as a democrat in the mayor's race," he continued. "And I got no support from the democratic party. As a matter of fact, party officials and leaders wore my opponent's shirt at the last election. That's how much support I got from the democratic party."

"Party politics do not matter in Hardeman County. None. Zero. Absolutely zero."

Citing a possible savings of \$30,000 for the county and the already non-partisan attitude of the commissioners, county mayor Jimmy Sain presented the act to the commission, where it was eventually approved by a 11-4 margin on April 12.

Voting against the measure were Elvis White, Major Wilburn, Vinscen forrow, and Anthony Pulse. All four ran for commission as democrats in 2014, as did Jackie Sain, Mike Madden, Jim Daniel, Bobby Doyle, and Elmer Cobb, who all voted in favor of the act.

Connie Young, who is on the ballot this August as a democrat, voted for the measure as well. Chandra Lake was absent from the meeting due to a family issue.

The only new face to the commission since the initial passage is Johnny Weems, who replaced Gary Barber in September.

Sain said during the meeting that many counties have non-partisan county elections. These include Fayette, Chester, and Haywood Counties, according to Hardeman County Administrator of Elections Amber Moore.

It is believed, if passed, Hardeman County would be the first in the State of Tennessee to do it by private act. The other counties that have non-partisan county elections do it by an agreement reached between the political parties.

The 110th session of the Tennessee General Assembly will convene January 10, 2017. The Hardeman County Commission is scheduled to meet January 19.








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Year in Review

October 6 – The Southwest Tennessee Development District named the Hatchie River Park as the district's project of the year. "The project of the year award is going to Bolivar because it is dedicated to enhancing and developing the phenomenal assets that the city has to offer residents and visitors," stated the press

November elections saw Bolivar voters pass the Wine in Grocery Stores referendum. The other contested races in the county went to Middleton incumbent Mayor Jack-

ie Cox, who defeated Doug Henderson by an unofficial tally of 128-121, and Willard Beshires beat Michael Vales 29-11 in the race for Silerton mayor.

Uncontested races in Hardeman County included Hornsby Mayor Mack Carter, as well as aldermen Raymond Cox, Wayne Isbell, Anita Johnson, Gregory Vance, Curtis Vandiver, Sandy Sanders, and Melissa Wilson all being elected to serve.

In Middleton, aldermen David Bo Callahan, Robert Evan Mott, Jimmy Simpson, Kevin Speck, and Richard Yopp will serve as will Saulsbury's Jim Daniel as mayor, and Rich Emerson, Carl Hayes, Lillie Reece, Johnny continued on A12

Another Story to Follow in 2017

Bolivar business woman Maria Howell saw her quest to open a package liquor store in Bolivar stalled again as the Bolivar City Council voted 4-3 (with Tracy Byrum abstaining) to not suspend the rules and then possibly vote on the issue during their meeting on November 8 in the Bolivar City Courtroom.

Howell's attorney, Shari Danielle Elks of Elks Law Firm in Burns, Tennessee had filed a Motion for Reconsideration in behalf of Howell pertaining to the October 18 rejection of Howell's request to approve her application to open a retail package store in Bolivar.

Voting against having another vote on the issue were Randy Hill, Willie McKinnie, Todd Lowe, and Suzanne Rhea.

Rhea had been cited in the October 28th Motion for Reconsideration as having a conflict of interest, stating, "An official with the responsibility to vote on a measure shall disclose during the meeting at which the vote takes place, before the vote and so it appears in the minutes, any personal interest that affects or that would lead a reasonable person to infer that it affects the official's vote on the measure. In addition, the official may recuse himself from voting on the measure."

Later Elks says in her brief that, "Councilperson Suzanne Rhea should have disclosed a conflict of personal interest on the issue." Councilman Randy Hill made it known he disagreed with Elks.

"When it was directly related to her brother, she did not vote. But when it comes to the City of Bolivar, where her interest is, it is her duty to vote," he said. "When talking about Bill, who played by the rules, who has invested thousands of dollars, and did what we asked him to do by building his liquor store in the DEVCO area. Now because somebody requests to move it outside, we're going to suspend the orders to move it outside which doesn't make a lick of sense. What if Maria had a factory with 300 jobs and wanted to put that right down past court square when we have a perfectly nice industrial park sitting out here west of town? Would we make all these provisions for that or would we ask her to build it out in the industrial park where all factories go? I don't understand what we're doing here, except making a long meeting over something we should've already gone to the house over. Just my opinion."

Councilman Julian McTizic responded, "To respond to that Mr. Hill, my opinion has been the same since we've started all this. To also respond to that, a factory has a zone- an industrial zone. A liquor store is a business and a business has a zone. That's my opinion, I respect your opinion, but I disagree with it, so I'm going to do what I can and I'm going to take any action, and I'll take as long as it takes. If it's an hour meeting, two-hour meeting, it doesn't matter. Before Mr. Bill or Mrs. Howell came forward, I've had the same stance on this. I don't think what we're doing is right. So I'm going to do whatever I can to try and change it. Fact is, the chances of it passing are better with 5 than it is with 6."

Prior to the vote on November 8, the city council and members of the audience were read a Facebook post from Howell detailing Howell's hopes for support at the meeting.

"I want to clarify that Tuesday, February 9 when Mrs. Howell made this presentation, she told us at that time she had nine businesses she wanted to establish. I want everyone to know that we're not against and we told her that night we were for her and she was an excellent business woman. We supported her efforts in these businesses. The problem being the liquor store was not in the zone. That's the page passed out to us and I want to clarify that this is on Facebook and social media, we have never said that we don't want her other businesses to open. All we've said is the liquor store is not zoned for that area. I want to clarify that and let people know that there's not a person on this council that's against business or new businesses coming into Bolivar," explained Mayor Stevens.

In late December, Howell's attorney filed a lawsuit against the city of Bolivar, Mayor Barrett Stevens, and each of the eight city council

November 23 – The annual "looking over the shoulder" by the State of Tennessee resulted in what Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain said was a "good audit".

The City of Bolivar Fire Department received 21 complete sets of new turnout gear and six Scott Sight Thermal Imaging Masks. Bolivar firefighters are the first in the state to obtain these masks that are designed with the latest technology, along with training for this equipment.

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
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


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The Unforgettable Lady Tigers

Bolivar Central running back Drek Lewis closed out his career with 50 yards and a touchdown in the Toyota East-West All-Star Football game in Cookeville, the first Tiger to play in the game since Mitch Ross in 2008.

Over his career, Lewis had 4,284 yards in total offense, gaining 9.3 yards each time he touched the ball.

His biggest year was his senior season, when he gained 1,554 yards in 174 carries and scored 24 touchdowns. Also, he caught eight passes for 133 yards and a touchdown.

For his career Lewis averaged 8.9 yards per carry, running 425 times for 3,792 yards and 50 touchdowns. He added three more touchdowns on 32 receptions and 492 yards.

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


The championship, begun in 2011, was won by Bolivar Middle for the first four years, followed by Middleton in 2015.


Lowe Brings Winning Back
