## They Ran, But They Couldn't Hide

Two escapees from the Western Mental Health Facility (WMHI) in Bolivar were captured Saturday, September 23, after a little more than thirty-six hours of freedom.

Caught were 31-year old Joseph Bortz and 22-year old Matthew Inman, who plotted their escape from Western while incarcerated together in Gibson County, reasoning that it would be easier to escape from a mental facility than a jail, according to Bolivar Police Chief Pat Baker.

Also according to Baker, their run to freedom ran into some trouble after they overpowered a WMHI employee, took a key card and used it, leaving the grounds by scaling the fence.

"They broke into a nearby cabin and got a coffee pot, some tea, a hot dog roaster, deer tent, and a roll of paper towels," said Baker, adding they made a makeshift camp on the land that held the cabin.

A tip from the landowner came when he checked his trail cameras, saw one of the escapees, and alerted police in Bolivar.

The presence of police in the area caused the pair to attempt to borrow a telephone from a nearby house to call for help. The homeowner allowed them use of the landline, but called the authorities on a cell phone at the same time.

Inman was captured when the authorities arrived and Bortz, who had fled across the road, was apprehended five hours later.

Baker said the escapees were surprised to learn they hadn't traveled more than about four miles from Western.

"They thought they were on the other side of Jackson," he added.

Baker said the department was grateful for the assistance of the Gibson County Sheriff's Department as well as the Tennessee Highway Patrol, who lent a helicopter to the search effort.

## Lifetime of Military Service Honored



Hardeman County dedicated a stretch of highway in Bolivar to the honor of Bolivar native Major General Fred D. Robinson, Jr., on September 22 in Bolivar.

Robinson's military career spanned more than 30 years ending with his retirement as a Commanding General, US Army Research, Development and Engineering Command, Aberdeen Proving Ground, Maryland.

His decorations and badges include the Distinguished Service Medal (with two Oak Leaf Clusters), the Bronze Star and more than a half dozen others.

"It says more about Hardeman County than it says about me," explained Robinson. "It says people here honor service for the country."

Robinson holds a BS in Engineering from the University of Tennessee, an MS in Industrial Systems Analysis from the University of Memphis, and an MS in National Security Strategy from the National Defense University.



## Search Suspended, Leads Sought

The active search for Bolivar resident James Perry, 83, of Bolivar has been discontinued by law enforcement but the Hardeman County Sheriff's Department continues to seek and follow various leads on his disappearance.

Last seen on Tuesday, September 12 at 11:00 a.m. near his residence at 110 Hollywood Acres Lane in Bolivar, Perry is described as a 5'8", 140-pound, African-American man who suffers from Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia. A Silver Alert was issued shortly thereafter.

Hundreds of volunteers and professionals from six different counties searched daily for more than a week for the Hardeman County native, who the family says does not drive and probably set out on foot from his residence.

He was last seen wearing a white polo shirt, blue jeans, and red, white and blue Adidas tennis shoes. He may or may not have his glasses.

According to Sheriff John Doolen, a tip led the department to Tupelo, MS this past week, but the sighting turned out to be a case of mistaken identity.

The reaction to his disappearance included a candlelight vigil September 21 in Bolivar.

## Mayors Get Carded at the Library by Jessica Simmons

Imagination Library Week, September 18-23, was celebrated in all 95 counties in Tennessee in partnership with the Governor's Books from Birth Foundation, which supports Imagination Library efforts across the state. Dolly Parton's Imagination Library provides one free book per month to children from birth through age five. By reading these books that are delivered to your mailbox each month aloud to children within the home, families help children develop the listening and literacy skills needed for school. In 1995, Dolly Parton launched an idea in her home county of Sevier, TN inspired by her father's inability to read and write. With a strong-minded vision, she was determined to nurture a love of reading among children and their families with the gift of a specially selected book each month. Growing up poor herself, Parton wanted to ensure that every child would have books, regardless of their family's income.

Most people believe that Dolly Parton herself pays for the books that are delivered to children enrolled in the program. While that is untrue, The Dollywood Foundation consults a blue-ribbon panel of authors and educators to select the books, manages the distribution and mailing of the books monthly, and maintains an online enrollment and book ordering system. The costs for the program are covered by the Governor's Books from Birth Foundation, along with private and corporate donations, to pay for 50% of the program cost, and each county's local library, raises the necessary funds to pay for the other 50%. The cost of providing one child with a year's worth of Imagination Library books is \$24, shared evenly between each county program and the Governor's Books from Birth Foundation.

The Hardeman County Imagination Library's mission is to



boost language acquisition, literacy, and kindergarten readiness in Hardeman County preschoolers by mailing one book to the home of every enrolled child each month. All children in Hardeman County, from birth to age five, are eligible to participate in the program at no cost to their family. Since inception, 85,248 books have been delivered with 848 of those books being delivered last month. 56.99% of preschoolers are currently enrolled and 1,829 five-year olds have graduated from the program since its start in Hardeman County.

The Bolivar-Hardeman County Library receives annual sponsorships from community banks, as well as other programs within the county. Their largest fundraiser, the annual golf tournament, raises almost half the needed funds for their part in a year's worth

of books for Hardeman County children. Library Director Bailee Hutchinson says, "Our numbers for the amount of children receiving books is constantly increasing. Although this is an extremely great thing, we need more sponsors we know year after year are dedicated to giving this amount. Once we know what to expect from donations, then we can better see the need in possible new fundraisers to help allocate the rest."

Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain and City of Bolivar Mayor Julian McTizic were at the library on Wednesday, September 20, in support of National Library Card Month and Imagination Library Week. Both Mayors received a new library card and talked about what it's like to do their job every day.

## Hardeman County Remembered by Lisa Coleman

There are few Southern sights more beautiful than those endless fields of white against the blue-Southern-autumn sky. I am seeing quite a few of those beautiful white fields across West Tennessee these days.

Cotton is one of those plants that is found in many parts of the world and has been for centuries. Early settlers in what would become America attempted cotton crops in different places, but it wasn't until Eli Whitney's cotton gin in 1793 that cotton became big business, and particularly so in the South. Our climate and soil are suited to the plant; the growing season is long and when the conditions are all right, there are thousands, millions of white bolls everywhere. The South's history and cotton's history are intertwined, which is fitting for a plant that is made into a thread, don't you think?. In 1850 there were 2.1 million bales produced in the Southern states that would become known as the Cotton Belt; less than 10 years later, 3.8 million bales were produced. Tennessee has long been one of the top 10 cotton producing states in the U.S.

When I see those cotton fields every year, I always think about my Papaw Kiestler. He never worked his own cotton fields, he always worked someone else's fields with a mule and a plow. He worked long, long rows in the hot Southern sun; whenever I drive to Cloverport I can still see some



of the fields where he plowed and planted and tended the cotton. This photo is him in the late 1940's, in the fields, near the Hardeman-Madison County line. He kept little notebooks with notes about the crop, the planting, the yields, and the sale prices; they were always in the front pocket of his overalls. I still have several of them that show how he spent his days in the cotton fields in the northern part of our county; what a treasure to have them.

Thinking about the cotton makes me think about cotton picking. Like the old song says, "I never picked cotton", but both of my parents did. A couple of years back my Mom and I were invited to visit a beautiful field of cotton in Cloverport and she showed me how to pick cotton. Standing there in that field she told me, "this sure was a hard way to make a little money". She told me she loved to pick behind my great-aunt Cille (Mary Lucille);

Aunt Cille was this tiny, tiny little woman, but she was a cotton picker. Aunt Cille often out-picked the biggest field hands and if she picked less than 400 pounds a day, she considered it a slow day. She always seemed to be able to "leave" a little for small hands she knew were picking behind her.

By the way, if you've never jumped into a cotton trailer full of cotton, you've missed a fun afternoon. There is something about jumping into the middle of that fluffy white that makes kids giggle with delight. I remember Mr. Dunn Mask allowing a troop of giggly Brownie Scouts to do that very thing one long-ago fall day on his farm near Hickory Valley, and that fun afternoon became another memory, another cotton story to weave in with my other ones.

Y'all, I guess that slogan by the cotton council is true in many ways; cotton is the fabric of my life – and the lives of lots of folks - in many ways.

I would like to thank everyone for coming out to Major General Doug Robinson's highway dedication on Friday, September 22, 2017.

Special thanks to Mayor Jimmy Sain, County Commissioner Bobby Doyle, and Representative Johnny Shaw for their part in accomplishing this task. We, the family, community and county are proud of Doug's service to our country. God Bless You All!

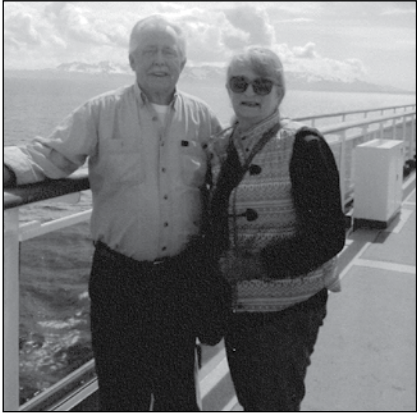

Mexican Lasagna

- Ingredients:
- 1 lb ground beef
- 1 cup water
- 1 (1 oz) packet taco seasoning
- 1 (16 oz) can refried beans
- 10 oven-ready lasagna noodles
- 1 (16 oz) jar mild salsa
- 1 (14 oz) jar alfredo sauce (or queso sauce)
- 2 cups Mexican blend shredded cheese
- optional toppings: sliced black olives, sliced green onions, taco sauce, sour cream

Directions

In a large skillet over medium heat, brown ground beef. Drain excess grease. Place back into the skillet. Over medium heat, add water and taco seasoning and stir. Then stir in refried beans. Mixture will be very thick. Once refried beans have softened and mixture is combined, turn off heat.

Preheat oven to 350f degrees. Spread about 1/4 cup of salsa into the bottom of a 9×13 baking dish. Place a single layer of lasagna noodles on top of salsa (I used about 5). Evenly spread half the ground beef mixture on top of the noodles. Then evenly spread half the alfredo sauce on top of ground beef. Then sprinkle one cup of shredded cheese. Next, dollop about half a cup of the salsa on top.

Continue these steps one more time (lasagna noodles, ground beef mixture, alfredo sauce, salsa and cheese). Cover with aluminum foil and bake for about 35-45 minutes. Allow to cool for about 10 minutes before serving (trust me on this – it will make slicing much easier!) Slice and top individual servings with sour cream, sliced green onions or whatever taco toppings you prefer!

## Here's Your Retirement Countdown

If you want to enjoy a comfortable retirement lifestyle, you don't need to have been born rich or even to have earned scads of money during your working years. But you do need to make the right moves at the right time – which means you might want to start a "retirement countdown" well before you draw your final paycheck.

What might such a countdown look like? Here are a few ideas:

Ten years before retirement – At this stage of your career, you might be at, or at least near, your peak earning capacity. At the same time, your kids may have grown and left the home, and you might even have paid off your mortgage. All these factors, taken together, may mean that you can afford to "max out" on your IRA and your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan. And that's exactly what you should do, if you can, because these retirement accounts offer tax benefits and the opportunity to spread your dollars around a variety of investments.

Five years before retirement – Review your Social Security statement to see how much you can expect to receive each month at various ages. You can typically start collecting benefits as early as 62, but your monthly checks will be significantly larger if you wait until your "full" retirement age, which will likely be 66 (and a few months) or 67. Your payments will be bigger still if you can afford to wait until 70, at which point your benefits reach their ceiling. In any case, you'll need to weigh several factors – your health, your family history of longevity, your other sources of retirement income – before deciding on when to start taking Social Security.


One to three years before retirement – To help increase your income stream during retirement, you may want to convert some – but likely not all – of your growth-oriented investments, such as stocks and stock-based vehicles, into income-producing ones, such as bonds. Keep in mind, though, that even during your retirement years, you'll still likely need your portfolio to provide you with some growth potential to help keep you ahead of inflation.

One year before retirement – Evaluate your retirement income and expenses. It's particularly important that you assess your health-care costs. Depending on your age at retirement, you may be eligible for Medicare, but you will likely need to pay for some supplemental coverage as well, so you will need to budget for this.

Also, as you get closer to your actual retirement date, you will need to determine an appropriate withdrawal rate for your investments. How much should you take each year from your IRA, 401(k) and other retirement accounts? The answer depends on many factors: the size of these accounts, your retirement lifestyle, your projected longevity, whether you've started taking Social Security, whether your spouse is still working, and so on. A financial professional can help you determine an appropriate withdrawal rate.


These aren't the only steps you need to take before retirement, nor do they need to be taken in the precise order described above. But they can be useful as guidelines for a retirement countdown that can help ease your transition to the next phase of your life.

Local Banks Announce Merger Plans

Two banks that have five branches between them in Hardeman County have announced plans to merge. Trezevant-based F&M Bancshares, Inc., the parent bank holding company of Centennial Bank (\$370 million in assets, as of June 30, 2017), and Bolivar-based Merchants & Planters Bancshares, Inc., the parent holding company of Merchants and Planters Bank (\$87 million in assets, as of June 30, 2017) today jointly announced the signing of a definitive merger agreement. The transaction is expected to close during the last quarter of 2017 or the first quarter of 2018, pending regulatory approvals, the approval of the shareholders of Merchants & Planters Bancshares, Inc., and the satisfaction of other customary closing conditions. Upon closing of the transaction, on a pro forma basis, Centennial Bank will continue to maintain regulatory capital ratios in excess of the "well-capitalized" level.



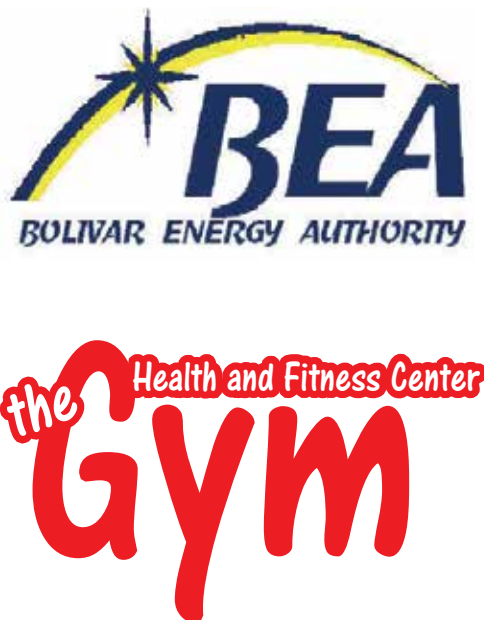

Before what is being guessed as the biggest crowd to attend a Bolivar Central Football game in the last 20 years, the Tigers blew out traditional rival Jackson South Side 42-7 on September 22.

"We came out and played hard," said Bolivar Central Head Football Coach Woodrow Lowe. "It wasn't easy, but we made the plays we needed to make and the defense stepped up."

The Bolivar defense, which had allowed 30.4 points per game this year and gave up 39 to South Side a year ago, stopped the Hawks cold time after time in the second half, while the Bolivar offense scored four touchdowns to turn a close game at halftime into a blowout.

Sophomore Omar Jones, who had an interception and recovered a kickoff in the first half, was named the Vaughan Oil Player of the Game, while junior Robert Jennings was named the Lineman of the Week.

The Tigers got off to a strong start, scoring on their first possession and after recovering the ensuing kickoff and scoring again. But the offense stalled for the remainder of the half and when South Side scored with 3:50 remaining in the half, it was 12-7 Tigers.

"We challenged them in the locker room and they came out and dominated the second half," added Lowe.



Bolivar's dominance in the second half began with a defensive stop and a blocked punt, followed by a 20 yard touchdown run by Trey Lowe. Jones ran in the extra point to make it 20-7. Correy Brown ran for two scores and Jalen Crisp added another in the fourth quarter to close out the scoring.

Bolivar (5-1, 1-1) ran for 241 yards, led by Brown with 91 yards and four touchdowns and quarterback Trey Lowe completed 13 of 16 passes for 198 yards.

Bolivar outgained South Side 439-155, holding the Hawks to only 80 yards on the ground in 28 attempts.

The win was Bolivar's third in the last four games against the Hawks. Coach Woodrow Lowe is 3-1 versus Jackson South Side and is the first coach since Errol Hook (1975-1983) to have a winning record against them after four or more games.

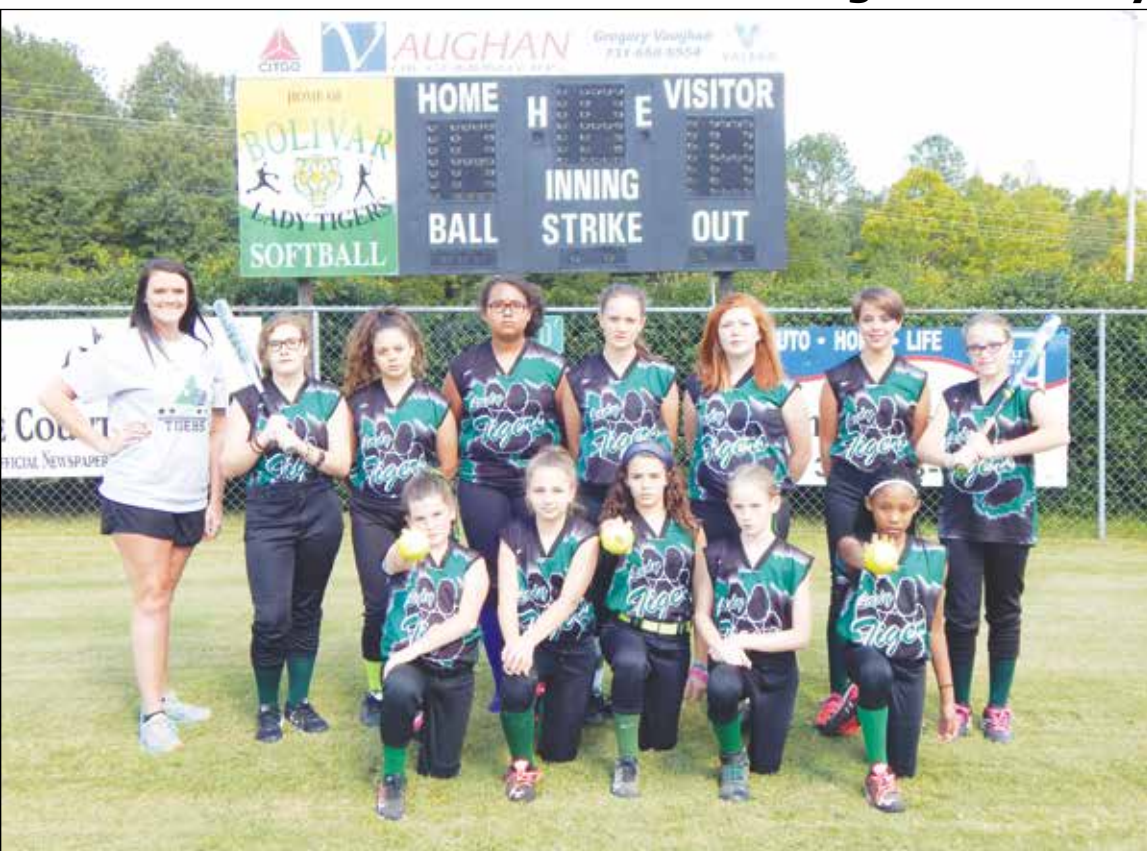

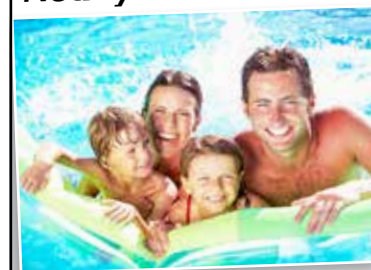

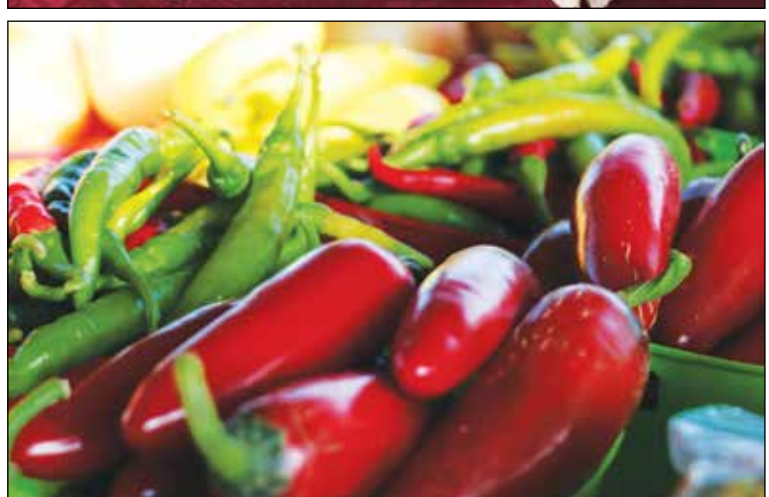
