

### Middleton Honors Longtime Citizen by Jessica Simmons

John Neely, who recently celebrated his ninetieth birthday, has lived in Middleton since 1929. Serving as his high school class president in 1944, he showed a heart for serving the people early on. He and his brother were Mascots for the first Boy Scout Troop in Hardeman County that was signed into effect by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. Mr. Neely volunteered to serve his country in WWII and spent his service in the Philippines. Becoming a Charter Member of the Middleton Lion's Club in 1948, he went on to open his own business; Neely's Service Station which operated for 36 years. In 1967, he became an alderman for the City of Middleton and was instrumental in recruiting Dover Elevator Systems to the area in 1968.

Mr. Neely served on the Board of Directors for the Bank of Middleton for over 20 years, followed by time spent on the Board of Di-



rectors for Merchants and Planters Bank. Fulfilling his duties on the Middleton Medical Board, he achieved building the first medical clinic and obtaining the first doctor and dentist. As a member of the county commission from 1966-1982, Mr. Neely was recognized as a critical asset in procuring the first ambulance in Hardeman County. He volunteered as a fireman for

the city volunteer fire department, served on the election commission from 1983-1995, and the Board of CBI Tire Company from 1965present. He is a current member of the planning commission and attends every meeting even at ninety years old.

and Health Administration. One such test requires all firefighters to wear their masks and Kelso determines if the masks are fitted properly, by supplying a stream of artificial smoke to see if it can get into

David Bryant of the National Fire Prevention Agency, provided training on proper handling, and quality of the new gear, along with the high quality material in which it is made. The new gear is made from a twill weave that is more flexible in the new condition, and it is able to withstand 1,000 degrees farenheit before even beginning to degrade. Being appropriate for this time of the year, Bryant told firefighters they could wrap the turkey in their turnout coat, put it in the oven at 450 degrees, and bake it until it was done without any damage to the coat. There may be some fabric discoloration to alert firefighters to thoroughly inspect their gear for rips, but there is no damage to the coat. He also explained the importance of methods of cleaning used to avoid cross contamination of outer elements, storage of the gear outside of the living quarters, and in a dark area to avoid UV lighting. Chief Price has already made arrangements for a storage unit for the new gear.


Junior Johnson, Emergency Vehicle Specialist, gave instruction on the Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). SCBA is a device worn by firefighters to provide breathable air in an immediate Dangerous to Life or Health Atmosphere. The Scott Sight Thermal Imaging Masks are equipped with Bluetooth connectivity. The masks have a small, wireless camera mounted on the outside that will display information to the firefighter on a screen in the bottom right half of the mask. Johnson explained that firefighters must train their eyes to look in two different directions at one time. The camera records what the firefighter is looking at, but they must also look at the screen for valuable information, such as victims, and hot spots. Images appearing in red alert the firefighters to hot areas, while white/gray objects are cool. They are also provided with the temperature of the objects. Masks will soon allow Chief Price to observe what the firefighters see through an APP on his phone. This will allow him to assist them in making crucial decisions in their safety, and rescuing victims.

Chief Price was given the opportunity to utilize the thermal imaging mask after a fire and was assured they were not leaving a hot spot at the location. He stated that the program will be in complete operation

# The Maxwell's Stay-at-Home Gourmet

### Traditional Pumpkin Pie

### Ingredients 1 recipe Pastry for Single-Crust Pie (see below)

1-15 ounce can pumpkin

2/3 cup sugar 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

3 slightly beaten eggs

1-15 ounce can (2/3 cup) evaporated milk

1/2 cup milk Directions

Prepare and roll out Pastry for Single-Crust Pie. Line a 9-inch pie plate with the pastry. Trim to 1/2 inch beyond edge of pie plate. Fold under extra pastry; crimp edge as desired. For filling, in a mixing bowl combine pumpkin, sugar, cinnamon, ginger, and nutmeg. Add eggs. Beat lightly with a rotary beater or fork just until combined. Gradually stir in evaporated milk and milk; mix well. Place the pastry-lined pie plate on the oven rack. Carefully pour filling into pastry shell. To prevent overbrowning, cover edge of the pie with foil. Bake in a 375 degree F oven for 25 minutes. Remove



foil. Bake about 25 minutes more or until a knife inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool on a wire rack. Refrigerate within 2 hours; cover for longer storage. Makes 8 servings. Pastry for Single-Crust Pie

### 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour

### 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/3 cup shortening

- 4 to 5tablespoons cold water Directions

Ingredients

Stir together flour and salt. Using a pastry blender cut in shortening until pieces are pea-size. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon of the water over part of the mixture; gently toss with a fork. Push moistened dough to side of the bowl. Repeat moistening dough, using 1 tablespoon of the water at a time, until all the dough is moistened. Form dough into a ball. On a lightly floured surface, use your hands to slightly flatten dough. Roll dough from center to edge into a circle about 12 inches in diameter.

### USDA Announces Conservation Stewardship Program

Starting in November, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) will accept and process applications for enrollment in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP), the nation's largest conservation program. Applications will be made available in local service centers.

NRCS has made several updates to the program this year to help producers better evaluate their conservaon options and the benefits to their operations and natural resources. New methods and software for evaluating applications will help producers see up front why they are or are not meeting stewardship thresholds, and allow them to pick practices and enhancements that work for their conservation objectives. These new tools also allow producers to see potential payment scenarios for conservation early in the process.

"This year, the Conservation Stewardship Program provides even more opportunities for conservation and greater flexibility at the local level to prioritize resource concerns and conservation approaches," says Kevin Brown, Tennessee NRCS State Conservationist. "Customized CSP tools for Tennessee will improve the customer experience during application evaluations."

NRCS offices will begin processing applications for the program on November 14, 2016, with sign-up running through February 3, 2017. People interested in the additional opportunities the updated CSP will offer can find information on the new CSP portal, located at http://www.nrcs.usda.gov/csp.

This one-stop shop, which provides information to help producers determine whether CSP is right for them, will be continually updated as more information becomes available. Changes that producers can expect to see include nearly double the enhancements and conservation practices offered and better reporting tools to tell producers the results of their conservation efforts on their land.

Through CSP, agricultural producers and forest landowners earn payments for actively managing, maintaining, and expanding conservation activities like cover crops, ecologically-based pest management, buffer strips, and pollinator and beneficial insect habitat - all while maintaining active agriculture production on their land. CSP also encourages the adoption of cutting-edge technologies and new management techniques such as precision agriculture applications, on-site carbon storage and planting for high carbon sequestration rate, and new soil amendments to improve water quality.


NRCS has addressed producer and stakeholder input requesting greater flexibility to address local resource concerns. Now, NRCS will more effectively utilize input from farmers, ranchers and partners in State Technical Committees and local workgroups to inform and expand conservation strategies under the program. Producers will be better prepared to apply because they will know these local ranking priorities and targeted resource concerns in advance.

CSP is for producers who are already established conservation stewards, helping them to deliver multiple conservation benefits on working lands, including improved water and soil quality and enhanced wildlife habitat. Information about CSP, including national and state ranking questions and enhancement descriptions, is available at www.nrcs.usda.gov/csp. Producers interested in the program should visit their local USDA Service Center to submit an application.

Since 2009, working with as many as 500,000 farmers, ranchers and landowners to protect over 400 million acres nationwide, USDA has invested more than \$29 billion to help producers make conservation improvements, boosting soil and air quality, cleaning and conserving water and enhancing wildlife habitat. ### Benefits When Everyone You Make Charitable Gifts

Now that we are in the heart of the holiday season, you may be thinking about ways you can put your money where your heart is. Specifically, you might be pondering which groups you should support with charitable gifts. And as long as you choose groups that meet the right criteria, your generosity can also be rewarding to you, in the form of tax benefits.

To begin with, you'll want to make sure you are giving to a reputable charity. That means you'll need to ask some questions. How does a group measure its effectiveness? Is it devoting as much of its contributions as possible to the actual work of the organization, or is it spending too much money on administrative costs? Generally, a worthwhile charity should spend at least 75% of its income on programs. You may be able to find this type of information on a charitable group's annual report and its website. You can also go to the website of one of the agencies that evaluates charitable groups. On these sites, you can get a lot of information dealing with a charity's effectiveness, income, spending and other topics.

After you've identified a charity, or charities, you can decide how much you want to give and how you want to give it. If the charity has 501(c)(3) status (named after the section of the Internal Revenue Code that governs such groups), your gift can offer you a tax deduction. So, for example, if you are in the 25% tax bracket, and you give \$1,000 to a qualified charity, you can subtract the \$1,000 from your adjusted gross income, which will result in tax savings of \$250. Upon making your gift, make sure you get a receipt that lists the name of the organization and the date and amount of your contribution. (Your maximum deduction will be limited to a percentage of your adjusted gross income.)

You can do more than simply write a check, however. If you have stocks that have grown significantly in value, you may want to donate them to a charitable group. You will be allowed a charitable deduction for the full fair market value of the gift on the date of the transfer, even if your original cost was only a fraction of today's value. Furthermore, you will avoid the capital gains taxes you'd have to pay if you sold the stock, provided you've held the stock for at least a year.

If you do contribute appreciated stocks, you will want to be cognizant of the effect of your donation on your portfolio. If you were to give a sizable amount of growth-oriented stocks, would it affect your overall growth potential? Conversely, if you are primarily giving away relatively conservative, income-producing stocks, would it end up moving your portfolio in a riskier direction? When donating stocks, if at all possible try to do so in a way that does not harm your portfolio's balance.

In any case, whether you give cash or appreciated assets, you'll need to make your gift by Dec. 31 if you're going to deduct it on your 2016 taxes. So be as generous as you can afford, think about the effect of your gift on your own financial situation - and be prepared

One other senior, Jacob Jetton of Bolivar, was also named to participate in the West Tennessee All-Star game.







### Sign of the Times by Jimmy Sadler

My daughter and I were making a giant chalkboard yesterday to get the attention of passerby traffic. I created a sleigh to follow behind. The sign, a giant sawhorse shape, started its usefulness today. As we were painting, an enormous amount of traffic looked on. The high volume area is slowed even more because of road construction. People even rolled down their window to ask what we were up to. We had attracted a lot of attention, but had nothing on the sign yet.

We continued painting and crafting the sleigh into the evening hours, and more people looked on curiously. One woman yelled "Is that for Santa Claus?" We were doing something different. People were not accustomed to seeing these along their normal route home. They were intrigued, which made me believe more strongly in this attempt to grab some attention. The trouble was, for a full day, we had no message. People were being asked to look at nothing but a giant black rectangle. As I pondered this, I realized I have become more and more like the blank sign. People notice my quirks in Christ, my slightly different way of seeing the world and the resulting values I place on things in my life. I fear,

however, when they try to figure out why I'm different, my sign is as blank as a chalkboard.

We were meant to be lights on a hill, not to be confused with neon signs pointing to a worldly solution to man's problems. We were meant to live in such a way that when people notice our outlook, values and faith changing because of Christ, they will take note and actually thank God for the good things they see.

"Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 5:16, NASB95).

We aren't supposed to prove to the world that we are better than they are. Alternatively, we are to follow Jesus to the extent that the world can't help but to see and realize that it isn't our own strength showing. This is true of the public at large, but also even in the home. We are encouraged to live in such a way that our unbelieving families, even our spouses, can see a picture of Christ.

Now for that blank sign. The way I see it, many people truly are following Christ and being changed by Him. Then, when the door is opened, or when traffic

Dwelling on the negative and ourselves will tend to drag us down deeper into depressing or despair. This is where serving others will assist in alleviating the depth of our sorrow. Associate with people who will desire to build you up and be an encouragement to you. Third, do not be intimidated by critics and you may meet some. 


