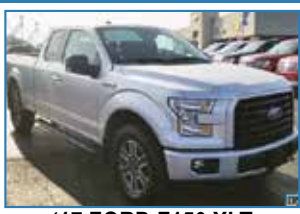

Toone Election Contested

The one-vote margin in the 2020 Toone Mayor's election has been contested with a suit filed on November 24, in Hardeman County Chancery Court as David Wayne Williamson says his wife didn't get a chance to vote for him on election day.

Filed by Attorney Matthew C. Edwards on behalf of Williamson, the suit asks for a trial to be held to either declare a tie in the 2020 Toone Mayors race at 51 votes each or to declare the entire election results void.

The narrative in the lawsuit says while Williamson and his daughter received the proper ballot on election day, his wife, Darla J. Williamson, voting at a separate time, did not. Instead, she received a

If the Election is Declared a Tie...Then What?

According to the Municipal Technical Advisory Service in Tennessee, if there is a tie vote between the two (2) or more persons having the highest number of votes for an office, the state election commission shall cast the deciding vote except that: . . .

(2) The municipal legislative body shall cast the deciding vote for municipal offices, or, in the alternative, the legislative body may by resolution call for a run-off election between the tied candidates;

Based upon the language in this provision, the City's Board of Mayor and Alderman (hereinafter "BOMA") will either have to vote and break the tie or pass a resolution calling for a run-off election for the office.

ballot that did not have the Toone Municipal election included. According to the lawsuit, she asked an election official why she was unable to cast her vote in the Toone

election but did not get an answer or a resolution of her issue before leaving the polling place.

The suit concludes that since Mrs. Williamson would have cast

her vote for her husband, but was not able to, the result of the election should have been a tie between Williamson and Kelley.

Election night ended with Kelley leading 51-50, but with a possible provisional ballot still unverified and uncounted and a certain recount to be done. After the provisional vote was not verified and a recount was done, the Hardeman County Election Commission certified the 51-50 win for Kelley on November 17.

Since the election for aldermen in Toone had only five candidates for six slots, Mrs. Williamson's possible failure to vote in that portion of the Toone ballot was not put forth as needing correction by the suit.

Look What They Found! The County Audit

The Tennessee State Comptroller's office placed the Hardeman County audit for fiscal year 2019-2020 online last week with eight findings by the state.

Among the findings were the use of the 1.) Drug Control Fund to reimburse the General Fund for vehicle maintenance and for overtime of Sheriff's employees; 2.) failure to reconcile payroll deduction amounts with payroll reports; 3.) budget operations failures; 4.) failure to hire a licensed contractor for projects exceeding \$25,000; 5.) a lack of segregation of duties within the Hardeman County Solid Waste and Animal control office; 6.) deficiencies in purchasing procedures; 7.) a lack of a material audit from the Office of Highway Superintendent; and, 8.) accounting deficiencies in the Office of the Trustee.

Hardeman County Mayor Jimmy Sain concurred with issues 2 and 3, but disagreed with 1, 4, and 6, pointing out that the Hardeman County Commission approved the use of the Drug Fund for the vehicle maintenance and overtime, that all work on projects were bid out and each awarded bidder was a licensed contractor, and that with only one employee at Solid Waste, segregation of duties was difficult at best.

On item 6, Sain said much of the finding pertains to the sheriff's department, of which he has no control over, and that much of it is assumptions, not facts. The sheriff's department concurred with the state



Bolivar FD Smoke Alarm Giveaway to Continue

In 2019, the Bolivar Fire Department implemented a program called, "RUAlarmed?" (pronounced Are You Alarmed?). The purpose of the program was to ensure that every household in the city of Bolivar was protected by smoke alarms. The program has been sidelined since March 2020 as the department staff has been unable to enter homes to install the alarms due to COVID-19 concerns.

"We are dedicated to our residents and want them to be protected," said Fire Chief Lynn Price. "Fire prevention and education has been one of our greatest successes at the department. This program is additional protection above and beyond our fire normal prevention & education programs."

The process for requesting alarms is very simple and can be handled by telephone. We are urging citizens to call us during normal business hours at (731) 658-9545 if they need alarms. There is absolutely no cost associated with the program, and the alarms are free.

The Bolivar Fire Department has installed 763 alarms through the program since January 1, 2019.

Items 7 and 8, were answered by Highway Superintendent Casey Swift and Trustee Mary Powell. On item 7, Swift said COVID-19 concerns over the amount of gas tax revenue played a part in the lack of a paper trail on the Highway Department Fund Balance at the end of the year, but promised to correct the deficiency. On item 8, Powell stated that her office will ask for assistance from the Local Government Data Processing Corporation in making corrections.

Advent Week 2 by Jeff Capshaw

The word Advent means coming or arrival. At Christmas, Advent pertains to Christ's birth. But it may also refer to Christ's Second Coming, and it is also the beginning of the liturgical year in Western Christianity.

The liturgical year consists of the cycle of liturgical seasons in Christian churches that determines when feast days, including celebrations of saints, are to be observed, and which portions of Scripture are to be read either in an annual cycle or in a cycle of several years.

For example, the liturgical seasons include Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, and the Season after Pentecost. The liturgical calendar specifies the annual cycle, the dates for the season, and the corresponding Old and New Testament passages to be read during the seasons.

Here is the suggested Gospel reading for this week. Mark writes, "the beginning of the gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in Isaiah the prophet, "Behold, I send my messenger before your face, who will prepare your way, the voice of one crying in the wilderness:

"Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,""

The passage continues, "John appeared, baptizing in the wilderness and proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And all the country of Judea and all Jerusalem were going out to him and were being baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair and wore a leather belt around his waist and ate locusts and wild honey. And he preached, saying, "After me comes he who is mightier than I, the strap of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. I have baptized you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit" (Mark 1:1-8, ESV).

It is striking that Mark begins his Gospel narrative with an Old Testament citation from the Prophet Isaiah and applies it to John the Baptist. Thus, he provides the reader with a continuity indicating that, what Yahweh had begun with Ancient Israel, he is continuing in Jesus the Messiah. Notice also that the description of John's appearance is indicative of a Prophet.

This eccentric messenger was

an attention-getter for sure, but he was not the primary focus. Even his outward act of baptism wasn't the main point. Instead, both his message his baptisms pointed to someone and something more. He was merely the forerunner announcing the coming, of the One greater than himself who would baptize repentant ones with the Holy Spirit.

Paul explains John's baptisms in the book of Acts. "And Paul said, "John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, Jesus" (19:4). Thus, John's baptism was an outward symbol of the inner cleansing that the Holy Spirit performs on those who confess their sins and believe in Jesus.

Jesus was John's real reason, and Jesus is the real reason for the Advent season.

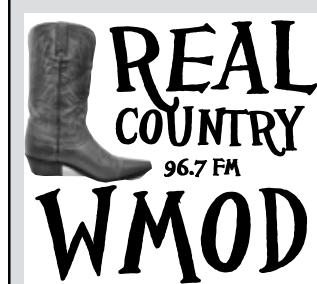

Consider These Year-End Financial Moves

We're nearing the end of 2020 – and for many of us, it will be a relief to turn the calendar page on this challenging year. However, we've still got a few weeks left, which means you have time to make some year-end financial moves that may work in your favor.

Here are a few suggestions:

Add to your IRA. For the 2020 tax year, you can put in up to \$6,000 to your traditional or Roth IRA, or \$7,000 if you're 50 or older. If you haven't reached this limit, consider adding some money. You actually have until April 15, 2021, to contribute to your IRA for 2020, but the sooner you put the money in, the quicker it can go to work for you. Your tax advisor can evaluate this type of move, along with others, to determine those that may be appropriate for your situation.

Review your investment mix. As you consider your portfolio, think about the events of these past 12 months and how you responded to them. When COVID-19 hit early in the year, and the financial markets plunged, did you find yourself worrying constantly about the losses you were taking, even though they were just on "paper" at that point? Did you even sell investments to "cut your losses" without waiting for a market recovery? If so, you might want to consult with a financial professional to determine if your investment mix is still appropriate for your goals and risk tolerance, or if you need to make some changes.

Evaluate your need for retirement plan withdrawals. If you are 72 or older, you must start taking withdrawals – technically called required minimum distributions, or RMDs – from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or similar retirement plan. Typically, you must take these RMDs by December 31 every year. However, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Stimulus (CARES) Act suspended, or waived, all RMDs due in 2020. If you're in this age group, but you don't need the money, you can let your retirement accounts continue growing on a tax-deferred basis.

Think about the future. Are you saving enough for your children's college education? Are you still on track toward the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned? Or have your retirement plans changed as a result of the pandemic?
