CWD Positive Tests Trend West

The Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency has announced its initial Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) response efforts were successful in the agency sampling more than 2,700 deer for the disease in the CWD Management Zone with the assistance of hunters.

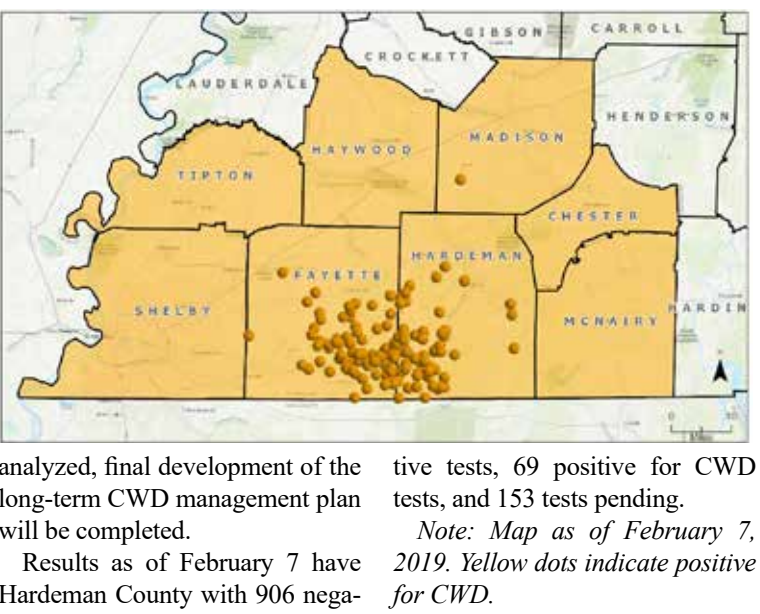
"Thanks to the cooperation of hunters and efforts by agency staff, we exceeded our sampling goals for the CWD Management Zone," said Chuck Yoest, CWD Coordinator. "The information gathered from these efforts is critical to developing a successful long-term CWD management plan."

The CWD Management Zone, established in December, has

grown to include eight Southwest Tennessee counties. The counties are Chester, Fayette, Hardeman, Haywood, Madison, McNairy, Shelby, and Tipton. Tipton County was just added this week upon confirmation of a CWD positive deer harvested near its border in the adjacent Fayette County.

Statewide, TWRA was able to obtain samples from almost 5,400 deer during the 2018-19 deer hunting seasons. All CWD positives found were harvested in Fayette, Hardeman, and Madison Counties.

It will take until later in February for all the results from the samples to be received by the TWRA. Once the results are received and

Bolivar Election Getting Popular

Nine candidates for four spots have picked up petitions in preparation for running for city councilmen in the upcoming Bolivar City Elections. The deadline, set for 12:00 p.m. on February 21, will require candidates to submit petitions with 25 signatures on it in order to qualify for the ballot.

Candidates who submit approved petitions will have until 12:00 p.m. on February 28 to withdraw, otherwise their names will appear on the ballot for the May 21 election. Early voting will take place May 1-16.

Potential candidates for District A, Position 1 are Lajuanda Polk and Carol Ann Spinks. Tommy Woods, who currently holds the position, has yet to pick up a petition.

The District A, Position 2 spot held by Larry McKinnie has a challenger in Donell Polk. McKinnie picked up a petition and had turned it in already to the Hardeman County Election Commission. Polk failed

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What Can Investors Learn From "Big Game" Teams?

In February, TV stations the world over will broadcast the most-watched U.S. football game of the year. But sports fans aren't the only ones viewing this "big game," held in Atlanta this year. The two teams competing are watched closely by the teams that didn't qualify. That's because these teams can learn a lot from the contenders. In fact, "big game" teams can teach some valuable lessons to many groups and individuals – including investors.

What investment insights can you gain from observing these teams? Here are a few to consider:

A good "offense" is important. "Big game" teams usually have the ability to score a lot of points. They can run the ball, pass the ball and move up the field quickly. As an investor, you also need to constantly seek gains – in other words, you need an "offense" in the form of an investment portfolio capable of producing long-term growth. Consequently, you will need a reasonable percentage of growth-oriented vehicles, such as stocks and stock-based mutual funds, in your holdings. Yes, these types of investments carry risk, including the potential loss of principal. But you can help reduce your risk level by holding investments for the long term – giving them time to possibly overcome the short-term drops that will inevitably occur – and by diversifying your overall portfolio with other types of investments, such as bonds and government securities, that will likely not fluctuate in value as much as stocks.

A strong "defense" is essential. In addition to having good offenses, "big game" teams are also typically strong on defense. They may give up yardage, and going against a strong offense, they will also give up points, but they still often stop their opponents from making the big, game-breaking plays. As someone with financial goals, such as protecting your family's lifestyle and helping send your children to college, you, too, have much to defend – and one of the best defensive moves you can make is to maintain adequate life insurance. Also, to protect your own financial independence – and to defend against the possibility of becoming a burden to your adult children – you may want to explore some type of long-term care insurance, which can help pay for the extraordinarily high costs of an extended nursing home stay.

The ability to adjust a strategy is essential. If a "big game" team is trailing, it very well might decide to switch its game strategy – perhaps they tried to keep the ball on the ground but fell behind, requiring them to throw more passes to catch up. To illustrate: If your current portfolio is not providing you with the returns you need to retire comfortably, you may well need to adjust your investment mix to provide more growth potential, but within the context of your risk tolerance and time horizon.

The "big game" is the culmination of a season of hard work by two teams that have achieved the highest level of success. And by applying the lessons you've learned from these teams, you can help contribute to your own success.

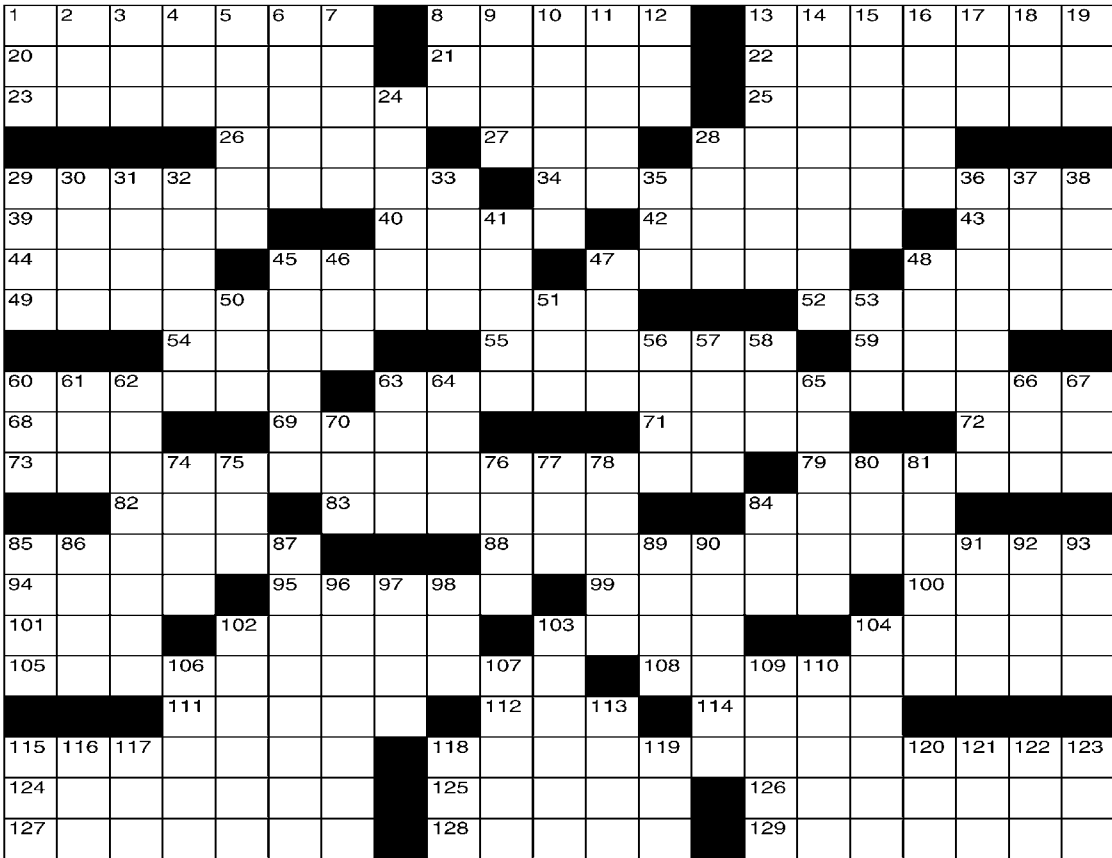

A Salute to 800 Wins

Bolivar Central's 64-36 victory over Ripley got Bolivar Central Head Coach Rick Rudesill his 800th coaching win of his career on January 29.

The 52-year old Rudesill came to Bolivar Central in 1996-1997 after five years at the University School of Jackson. After six years with the boys, he also took over the Bolivar Central girls program in 2002-2003.

His team at USJ, beginning in 1991-1992, was 65-75, and his overall record at Bolivar Central is 740-453.

Under Rudesill's leadership two players (Willie Kemp and Cameron Crisp) have won the TSSAA's Mr. Basketball and three players (Brian Lake, Willie Kemp, and Jay Murphy) have been named the TSSAA State Tournament Most Valuable Player.

Rudesill, a graduate and four-year starter at Union University in Jackson, is a member of the Jackson-Madison County Sports Hall of Fame, with his induction in 2015. He played his high school years at Jackson North Side.

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Ten Years to Remember: 2002-2011

From 2002 until 2011, if you planned your vacation around the state championships in Murfreesboro each year, you got to see Bolivar Central in action almost every year.

The exceptions saw the Tigers get within one game of the final eight in each of the seasons, losing 64-63 to Giles County in 2003 and 76-68 to Giles County in 2007.

During those years, the Tigers weren't very good neighbors either, beating their closest rivals more than 90% of the time, including Jackson South Side in the 2004 State Championship game. That season Bolivar beat South Side twice in the regular season, in the district championship game, the region championship game, and in the final.

Their lone losses to McNairy Central and Chester County came in 2010-2011 and the one loss to Middleton came in the 2005-2006 season, the year after both teams won their respective state championships.

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Salutes Coach Rick Rudesill Championship Teams and Milestone Wins

The First One...

It's rare to play a team five times in a season, but the Tigers would face Jackson South Side on March 20, 2004, having won the first four games between the two during the regular season.

In the final, Bolivar came out firing, with JoJuan Walker and Kyle Becton combining for seven three pointers in the first half to give the Tigers a 49-32 lead and they cruised to their first state championship title. Bolivar had only scored 80 points in the first two games, but beat South Side for the fifth time that season, 80-60. Brian Lake had 11 points in the final and was named the tournament MVP. Willie Kemp had 19, Walker 13, Becton 16, and Olajuwon Kemp 16.

Bolivar beat Raleigh-Egypt 41-38 and beat Martin Luther King 39-36 in the first two rounds.

Two in a Row...

Bolivar and Raleigh Egypt met for the state championship on March 19, 2005, after Bolivar had beaten Sullivan Central and Martin Luther King in the first two rounds in Murfreesboro.

Bolivar led Raleigh-Egypt 12-2 at the end of one quarter, 25-10 at the half and 36-26 at the end of three, but found themselves behind 40-39 with 1:36 left in the game.

Brandy Robinson hit a free throw to tie the game at 40. After a missed layup by Raleigh Egypt, Willie Kemp, who led the Tigers with 17 points and 5 assists, grabbed the rebound, was fouled and made both free throws with 47 seconds left.

Misses by Raleigh Egypt and free throws by Robinson and Olajuwon Kemp sealed the win for Bolivar. Wayne Chism, Olajuwon Kemp were named to the All-Tournament team, while Willie Kemp was named MVP.

"Back in November, the season could have gone either way."

Rick Rudesill's words at the final press conference of the season gave away the secret: in the early going, he didn't really know.

Four months later, he knows.

The 72-62 win over Liberty last Saturday in the championship game was their 14th in a row and the 4th over rival Liberty, beating them in the regular season on February 12 and then in the district and regional championships.

Bolivar defeated Knoxville Fulton 38-35, Marshall County 64-58 in overtime, and Liberty. The victory over Liberty was the fourth in five games over the Crusaders in 2009-2010.

O'Neal Woods, Ricky Tisdale, and Trey Polk were placed on the all-tournament team, with Jay Murphy winning the MVP.

"We played three great games," said Rudesill. "Our shots didn't fall the first two games, but we ground it out. We needed to have a final game like the one we did. I don't know if we could have ground out another one."

"It's a bunch of teams and kids. And when the old ones come back around, they know the love is there. Our first state title in '04, I'm sitting up in the bleachers, high up in the Murphy Center. I've got the gold ball, the AAA game is going and a young man walks up and nods congratulations. I nod and shake his hand and he starts to walk off and I realize it's William Kirkland, who played for me at USJ. He lived in the area and came to watch us. And he was as proud as any Bolivar Tiger in the building. He could look out there and see us running the same stuff he ran, went through the same things we did and could say we were all teammates. There is a bond there. Through the years and between the schools."

"It's so many more people than just the kids tonight," said Rudesill. "And everybody enjoyed it knowing they were a part of it. It was kind of a surprise to our players, but I did let them know today at school what was going to happen tonight."

With an overall coaching record of 805-528, Rudesill's teams have won 60% of their games, and has a 62% winning record at Bolivar Central.

His boys teams have won three state championships, in 2003-2004, 2004-2005, and 2009-2010. His girls teams have made the Murfreesboro final eight twice, including a final four run in 2005.

to get the nod for Quintessia Hamer’s spot in 2017 that went to Woods.

The District B, Position 3 spot held by Tracy Byrum has three candidates so far: Barbara Fitzhugh, Larry Crawford, and Jimmy Howell.

Howell also picked up for the District B, Seat 1 spot currently

held by Todd Lowe. Lowe also picked up for his spot as did Daisy Harvey. Howell will only be able to turn in petitions for one of the two positions.

Last time Bolivar held an election in a non-mayoral year, a total of 341 of 3,378 registered voters went to the polls, costing the City of Bolivar almost \$9,200 or

\$26.28 per vote according to the Hardeman County Election Commission. Bolivar is the only municipality in Hardeman County that does not follow the federal election schedule, which would move more than 90% of the expenses of the election to the federal government.

Law and the Prophets: Sermon on the Mount-Part 4

by Jeff Capshaw

In the same way stories are composed with simple past tense verbs, the backbone of texts like this sermon is structured by commands. If readers miss those, then they miss the point. However, before proceeding to the more familiar of Jesus’ explicit exhortations in the Sermon on the Mount, it is necessary to highlight Jesus’ view of Scripture. A Christian cannot improve on that; Jesus taught that all Scripture is important and relevant.

Jesus is not only providing ethics for Kingdom dwellers to follow, but he also is confronting the contemporary, Jewish interpretations of Scripture. Consider this: therefore whoever relaxes one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do the same will be called least in the kingdom of heaven, but whoever does them and teaches them will be called great in the kingdom of heaven. For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of

heaven (Matthew 5:19-20, ESV).

While the Pharisees and Teachers of the Law “teach man-made ideas as commands from God” (Matthew 15:9), Jesus emphasized a faithful and holistic reading, interpretation and application of Scripture. But this isn’t always the case. For example, the Old Testament scholar, Brevard Childs, illustratively used a graphic phrase: “a-canon-within-a canon.” That means some interpreters fixate on a few, arbitrarily chosen parts of Scripture by which to build-up and formulate alternative, religious traditions.

Historically, all sects and heresies, emerge from this sort of random reading and application of the Bible. That is why Jesus’ first command is “do not think that I have come to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I have not come to abolish them but to fulfill them” (5:17). Jesus stamps the entire Old Testament with his divine authority: not just selected parts of the canon.

He punctuates the point by say-

According to a recent report, from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, in 1900 there were 709,000 (9.3 %) marriages and 55,751 (0.7 %) divorces. Recent estimates were 2,221,379 (6.4 %) marriages per 1,000 total populations and 800,909 (3.7 %) divorce rate per 1,000 population. ¹ Not only are there more divorces, but both males and females marry later than several generations ago. HAA would like to say a sincere thank you to Mr. Ken Hadley. Mr. Hadley has done a magnificent job getting the land set for detailed preparation for the slab. We have someone lined up to complete the work that he started on the site, which includes having footers dug, gravel set, and dirt work completed to assure all outside drainage will be directed away from both buildings. This work will begin on February 18. We are currently awaiting confirmation that the County can provide us with 35 tons of CR-610 crushed stone.

The next step is having the concrete slab poured that our new building will sit on. We are also working to finalize designs for the internal drainage system that can accommodate all of the dog kennels. We are looking into pre-formed trench drains that are able to hold up to the necessary cleaning agents and elimination. These are common drain types for such a building.

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Ames Plantation: It's Not Just for the Birds, Part II

After acquiring the plantation in 1901, Hobart Ames operated it as a hunting preserve, cotton plantation, and livestock operation until his death in April 1945. From its original 400 acres, Ames, over the years, added additional land until, at its peak, the plantation consisted of approximately 26,000 acres. This passed to his wife, Julia, under whose ownership and in subsequent years, the Foundation's, the plantation now totals approximately 18,400 acres.

Prior to her death in January 1950, Mrs. Ames determined she would memorialize her husband's name. She accomplished her dream through the establishment of the Hobart Ames Foundation. Trustees of this foundation are charged with the operation of the plantation for the benefit of the University of Tennessee and to provide grounds and administrative support for field trailing bird dogs.

Under the direction of the Trustees, Ames Plantation has, over the past 70 years, become a self supporting entity involved in interpreting, understanding, and preserving its land base. In many respects the plantation has become a laboratory for regional preservation and historical issues. It is a Research and Education Center for the Tennessee Agricultural Experiment Station system of the University of Tennessee. In this capacity, Ames evaluates various row crop commodities for the benefit of producers in this part of the State of Tennessee.

The Plantation plants 850 acres of soybeans, 700 of corn, 200 of wheat and cotton, and 70 of sorghum grain. Income derived from these crops are used to fund research, pay labor, and maintain infrastructure.

The foundation's goal of researching and preserving the history of the region has led to Ames being one of the most heavily documented landscapes in the south as well as one of the largest research centers in the United States. This activity has led to the discovery of 225 historic sites including homesteads, slave quarters, churches, schools, and cotton gins. Research has also located 26 cemeteries with 19th century origins. Prehistoric Native American ceremonial mounds have been discovered and researched archaeologically as well. Much of the research at Ames is accomplished through programs involving assistance from the faculty and students from the Uni-

versity of Memphis, Mississippi State University, and Rhodes College as well as the University of Tennessee.

Another area of interest at Ames is the Forestry research program. Approximately 15,000 acres of the plantation are a source for forest and ecological research. A unique and dynamic scientific project called "precision forestry" is one concept used by Ames staff along with faculty and graduate students from various participating universities. Students are often in residence at the plantation for weeks or even months completing research projects. This area of research also produces income since it is a pine and hardwood resource.

Wildlife research is another area Ames, because of intense forestry practices, is well suited to conduct. Turkey, deer, and squirrel are abundant. Because of the Bird Dog Field Trials, quail habitats are intensely managed and the population is excellent. Beyond these game animals, the plantation has, and is today, conducting research on many other species including mice, hawks, beaver, and coyotes. This line of research leads to other areas of study such as ticks.

Just one example of studies undertaken by Dr. Allan E. Houston, Ames researcher and a Professor at the University of Tennessee, involves beaver and their habitats. His research, along with others from the University's Department of Forestry, Wildlife, and Fisheries, showed beaver to be responsible for more damage to forest lands than all other vertebrate species combined. A main focus of the study was reforestation of drained beaver habitat through artificial regeneration of the woodland as opposed to natural regeneration. Information derived from these studies, as an example, may have substantial financial impact on the timber industry in the future. The results of literally dozens of Ames studies have been published by Dr. Houston in collaboration other educational and professional associates. These publications are distributed and available to other researchers throughout the nation.

Historical research of past landowner families is ongoing. While genealogy is important, the Ames investigation is more focused on what the families were doing during the time they resided on the plantation's property.



One additional activity at the plantation is a limited membership hunting club. Deer, turkey, and squirrel hunting is available to members. Work is now underway to develop a duck hunting habitat which will be utilized in the future.

History, agriculture, forestry, wildlife,

cattle, archaeology, and education. Ames Plantation is so much more than just a location for bird dog field trials! It's surprising even most life long area residents are unaware of the scope and importance of the research done there.
