Unit CWD Gun Season Opens

Hunters in Hardeman and surrounding counties will get an earlier start on gun season for deer this year, but it's not all good news.

Opening on November 9, in contrast to November 23 for the rest of the state comes on the heels of Tipton County being added to the counties in Tennessee that are now considered CWD areas, making a total of eight.

The increase in the length of the season and allowing more deer to be taken is rooted in a hope that fewer deer in the CWD areas will result in less deer interactions.

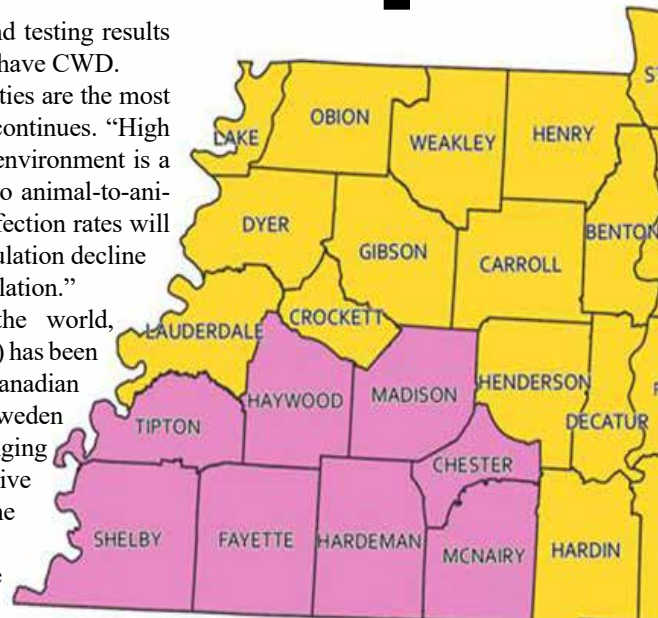
"TWRA's goal is to keep CWD from spreading and to keep the number of infected deer to a minimum, reducing infection rates where possible. Hunter harvest is the only feasible way to accomplish this," said the TWRA press release.

Also according to the release, bucks are more likely to spread the disease, since they have larger

home ranges than females and testing results show they are twice as likely to have CWD.

"Fayette and Hardeman Counties are the most heavily impacted," the release continues. "High disease rates there indicate the environment is a source of infection in addition to animal-to-animal contact. Left unchecked, infection rates will continue to grow, causing a population decline and a younger overall deer population."

Around the country and the world, Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) has been detected in 26 US states, three Canadian provinces, Norway, Finland, Sweden and South Korea in free-ranging cervids and/or commercial captive cervid facilities. Members of the cervid family in North America include white-tailed deer, mule deer, elk, and moose.



Stanley Resigns Post as Chief

Faced with a diagnosis stemming from a 2011 injury in the line of duty, Whiteville Police Chief Steven Stanley announced that he would resign from the department he served almost fifteen years.

"I would like to take a minute to express my gratitude to the Town of Whiteville for allowing me to be their chief of police for nine years and captain for five years prior to that," he said. "I would like to tell my guys that I have worked, fought, bled, laughed and cried with that I love you guys and I will always have your back."

Whiteville Mayor Aubrey Phillips said Stanley will be missed.

"He's done a good job. I hate that he has the medical issues," said Phillips. "I wish him the best."

"I would like to say thank you to the citizens of Whiteville for trusting me to be your chief and allowing me to serve you all," Stanley



added. "I will remain a resident of Whiteville and am available if anyone needs me."

Phillips said the job will be advertised, with the police commissioner, the city administrator and possibly one more consultant to screen candidates to narrow the field to be voted on by the city aldermen.

Phillips said Ben Davis will serve as the acting chief until Stanley's replacement is named.

County Commission to Replace Doyle

The Hardeman County Commission is expected to nominate and vote on a replacement for Commissioner Bobby Doyle at their regularly scheduled meeting of the commission on November 19.

Doyle, who served 29 years, stepped down in October after being named acting Superintendent of Schools in place of Warner Ross II, who was deployed.

The remaining 15 members of the commission will control the nominations and will vote on the candidate. If there are more than two candidates, the commissioners will vote, with the lowest vote getter being eliminated until only two candidates remain, after which the leading vote getter is expected to be sworn-in and take their seat on the commission immediately.

TCAT Whiteville Gets a Million Dollars

The Tennessee College of Applied Technology (TCAT) in Whiteville will receive \$1 million under the grant program for the Southwest Tennessee Alliance for Advanced Manufacturing Programs under provisions of the Governor's Investment in Vocational Education (GIVE) Act.

"I am very pleased that the TCATs in Whiteville and Crump will receive these large grants," said Senator Dolores Gresham, who is chairman of the Senate Education Committee and helped sponsor the bill.

"This program helps reach the students that may not be on a track to go to a four-year university but can get a head start on job skills that will allow them to transition into the workforce, whether it is welding, medical transcription, becoming an EMT, or a wide variety of other professions. Our TCATs and community colleges offer courses that students can take to help them get a high-skill, high-demand job. These funds will be a huge boost in our efforts to give more Tennesseans life-changing opportunities for success in the workplace."

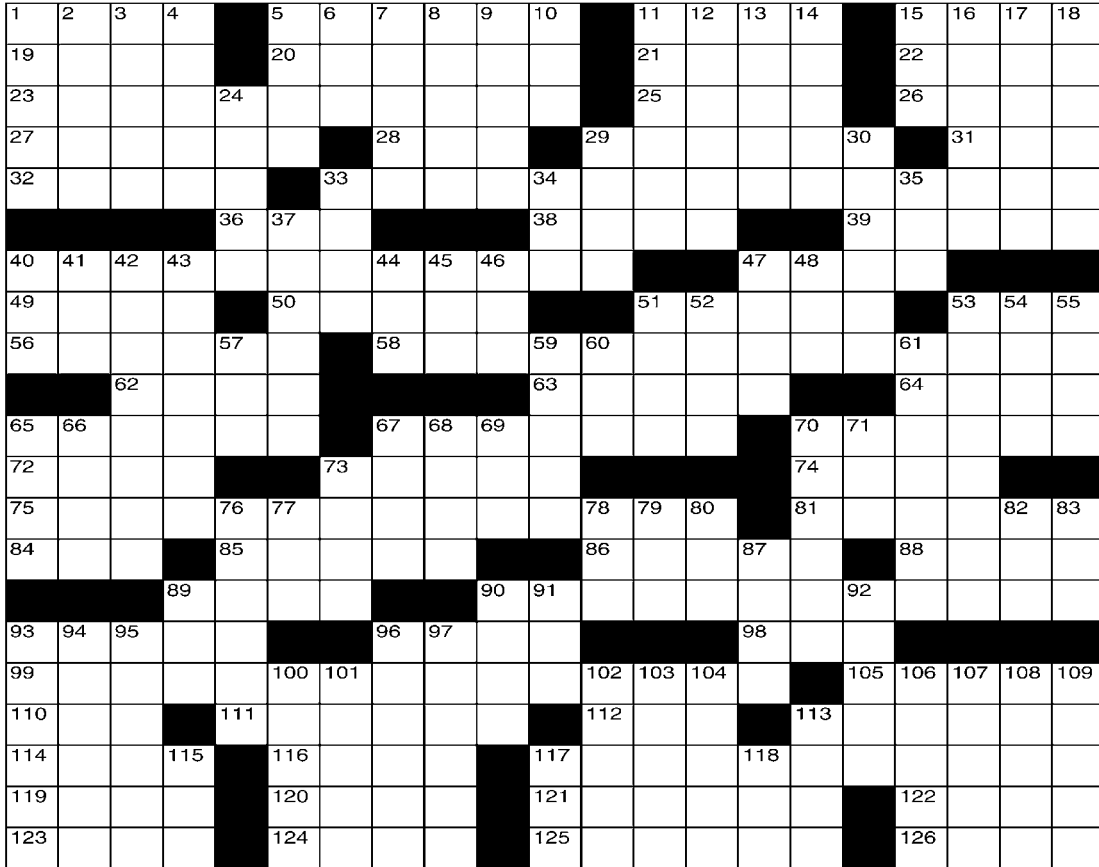

Southern Pecan Pie

Ingredients

- 1 (9-inch) frozen pie crust or make your own
- 1 1/2 cups chopped pecans or pecan halves
- 3 eggs beaten
- 1/2 cup white granulated sugar
- 3 tbsp salted butter melted
- 1 cup dark corn syrup
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 tsp vanilla extract

Instructions

- Preheat oven to 350F degrees.
- Take frozen pie crust out of the freezer and place it on a baking sheet while preparing the filling.
- Or, if you are using the Wham Bam pie crust, prepare the crust, prick it with a few holes using a fork, and then stick it in the refrigerator while preparing filling.
- In a medium bowl, whisk together beaten eggs, sugar, melted butter, corn syrup, ground cinnamon and vanilla extract until thoroughly combined.
- Place the pecans into the bottom of your pie crust. Then pour the filling on top of the pecans.
- Bake for about 45-50 minutes.
- Around the 20 minute mark, you may want to add some aluminum foil on top of and around the edges of your pie crust to keep it from getting too browned.
- Oven times do vary, but basically, the middle of the pie should be just a tad jiggly when done (not overly jiggly) and the center will puff up a bit.

Prayers of Paul Part 1 by Jeff Capshaw

The last few columns have centered upon topics related to the theme of newness: e.g. the new birth, the new man, the new creation and the new heaven and earth. In this and the following weeks' columns, I will offer brief meditations on the content of selected Pauline prayers. This week's lesson comes from Philippians 1:3-9.

After thanking the Philippian Church for their partnership in the Gospel, Paul says, "and I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ" (1:6). He continues by asserting that his feelings for them were right because they were fellow partakers in grace: "both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel" (1:7).

Afterward, Paul's deep affection for the Philippians (v. 8) expressed itself in a condensed prayer for their spiritual well-being. That prayer is unmistakably organized around three key ideas: abounding in love, approving what is excellent, and being filled with righteousness (vv. 9-11). Thus,

the prayer begins, "and it is my prayer that . . ." (v.9).

First, he prays that their "love may abound more and more" (v.9). God himself is love, according to 1 John 4:7 & 16, and Christians are commanded to love each other. Jesus taught his disciples to love even their enemies. Thus, Paul urges the Philippians to grow in love, but he adds that love is to grow "with knowledge and discernment." What does this mean?

According to William Barclay, "that love, which was not merely a sentimental thing, was to grow in knowledge and sensitive perception so that they would be more and more able to distinguish between right and wrong. Love is always the way to knowledge" (Commentary on Philippians).

Second, Paul prays that the Philippians "may approve what is excellent" (v.10). The original language helps here, and may better be rendered in English as "genuine." It seems that Paul's desire is for the believers at Philippi to be genuine in their character. The following reason extends that idea, "and so be

pure and blameless for the day of Christ" (v. 10).

Finally, he prays that the Philippians would be, as their ultimate aim, "filled with the fruit of righteousness" (v. 11). To put it another way, he wants the fruit to be "righteousness." However, it is a righteousness not of their own doing, but it is one that comes through Jesus Christ and results in glory and praise to God (v.11).

Here is the application for this week and, doubtless, the ones to come as well. Simply compare the content of Paul's prayers with those which you pray and with those you hear from others. Think hard about how they compare. Rather than praying longer or harder, perhaps we should learn to pray smarter or, in other words, more biblically for the spiritual well-being of our brothers and sisters in Christ.

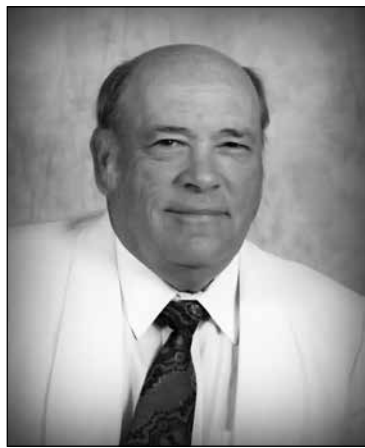
BILL DEEN DECEMBER 16, 1937-NOVEMBER 10, 2019

That Championship Season: 10 Years Ago This Week

This season, the Bolivar Bulletin Times will look back at ten years ago, following week by week the 2010 Bolivar Central Tigers State Championship season.

Bolivar Central was coming off of a semi-final appearance at the state championships, losing on a buzzer beater to Knoxville Fulton, who went on to win the state championship.

"This will hurt for a while," said Bolivar Central Basketball Coach Rick Rudesill after the game. "We had a good season but this loss is painful."

Returning starters Jay Murphy, and Ricky Tisdale, along with contributors Keegan Fuller, O'Neal Woods, and Demetricus Whitehorn, from the 2009 squad were expected to play a big role as well.

Opening night - November 17, 2009 vs. McGavock: The Tigers began their 2009-2010 season with a 74-60 win in Bolivar. Guard Jay Murphy led Bolivar with 17 points, hitting three threes in the third quarter to put the game out of reach. Also in double figures were Ricky Tisdale with 13, Kooper Kesler with 11, O'Neal Woods with 11, and Keegan Fuller had 10. Demetricus Whitehorn came off the bench for 6, and Tevin Coleman had 6 as well.

November 18, 2009 vs. Cane Ridge: Twelve different Tigers scored with Coleman and Tisdale leading the way with 10 each as Bolivar beat Cane Ridge 63-48. Bolivar led 29-8 at the half and 46-26 at the end of three quarters.

Bolivar would take the next nine days off, with Covington and Ridgeway coming up. More next week.
