OUR Kids are Smarter than THEIRS

It may not rise to the level of "veni, vidi, vici," but Hardeman County students did conquer the ACT (American College Test) at the highest level in years.

The 19.2 average among all public school students is not the highest in the state, but it is better than four of the five counties that surround Hardeman County.

"We are excited and proud to see the ongoing improvement in our students' ACT scores," said Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross. "It's rewarding to see that our students are not only competing academically with peers, but outperforming others in surrounding districts."

Of the 130 school districts listed in the re-

port released by the State of Tennessee, Hardeman County's graduating class of 2018 was 91st, but better than McNairy County (93rd), Madison County (116th), Haywood County (118th), and Fayette County (126th).

The only surrounding school district that scored higher than Hardeman was Chester County (51st) at 20.2.

Ross was quick to give credit where credit is due.

"The effort that our staff, students and parents have done in this area is to be congratulated. The work is a result of a deliberate plan and effort and by the entire team. This opens additional doors of opportunity for our stu-

dents to take full advantage of the Tennessee Promise and other scholarship monies available to students."

The report used students' best ACT scores meaning that if a student took the ACT multiple times, the score included in the results was his or her highest score. This data is different than the results reported nationally by ACT which are based on the last score a student received, regardless of whether it was the highest, and also includes private school results. Germantown Municipal School District had the highest district ACT composite in the state for the third year in a row, posting a 25.9 average.

Bolivar Middle Earns 5-Star Status

Bolivar Middle School celebrated reaching the highest status possible for the 2017-2018 year, a Level 5 rating.

"We're very excited to see the hard work of staff and students resulted in the Bolivar Middle School team achieving the highest levels of growth," said Superintendent of Schools Warner Ross. "They are to be celebrated as this reflects positively on their effort and determination."

"I want to acknowledge the hard work of our faculty for strategically knowing where our students' academic deficits were last school year," said Principal Mary Ann Polk. "I am especially proud of the students for taking T-CAP seriously in the midst of all the testing madness. What an honor it is to be a part of such awe-



School Report Shows Progress

Using TCAP testing data, including math, English language arts, and science, the Hardeman County schools came out with a 2018 Satisfactory Rating by the Tennessee Department of Education. Ratings were given as Exemplary, Advancing, Satisfactory, or Need of Improvement.

For 2017, Hardeman County was listed as "progressing," which were for "Districts that are improving but not meeting the growth expectation for all students and historically underserved student groups, on average."

"With all the challenges and interruptions associated with last year's testing program, I am proud of our students and teachers for their effort

and performance. While we have more work to do, the recently released accountability ratings published by the Tennessee Department of Education demonstrate that our students and staff didn't quit...they didn't give up and were determined to give a positive accounting for the work test, but I believe this attitude to be a key part of the success we did have this past year," said Superintendent of Schools, Warner Ross.

Hardeman County was one of twenty-six schools listed as Satisfactory for 2018. School districts in surrounding counties were Madison (Satisfactory), McNairy (Need of Improvement),

Chester (Advancing), Haywood (Satisfactory), and Fayette (Advancing). Statewide, fourteen districts were exemplary, eighty were rated advancing, and twenty-six were in the need improvement category.

The 2015, 2014, and 2012 ratings showed Hardeman County as "In Need of Subgroup Improvement."

Hardeman County was not listed in the 2013 rankings and no statewide rankings were done in 2016.

The state ranking categories have changed each year since 2012, although most years have contained the terms "exemplary" and "need of improvement" as ratings.

Amos: A Prophet for Us - Part 10 by Jeff Capshaw

This is the final installment on selected themes from the Old Testament prophet, Amos. The relevance of his ancient message for modern times is still striking. Certainly, it hasn’t been my aim to use Amos’ message as a club. Instead, I intended to call attention to the social maladies of the day. I further wanted to remind readers of the inadequacies of secular responses to them, while also encouraging believers to pay closer attention and to heed Amos’ remedy: take action!

The Church should do a better job of addressing inequalities, social injustices, poverty, domestic violence, addiction, mental disorders and so on. Generally, we have been ill equipped, because we failed to target them with the good news of the Gospel. Nonetheless, Luke 4:18 still rings true. Jesus said, *the Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free . . .* (NIV).

In spite of Israel’s unfaithfulness to the LORD and to the covenant, Amos doesn’t not end his book on a bleak note. Surely, Israel was judged in 722 BC when Sargon II conquered Samaria. Then, in 587 BC, Jerusalem was sieged. Finally, the Babylonian general, Nebuzaraddan, was sent to complete its destruction. Jerusalem was plundered, and Solomon’s Temple was destroyed. Most of the elite were taken into captivity in Babylon. The city was razed to the ground, and only a few people were permitted to remain to tend to the land. Way back in the Pentateuch, Moses had warned the nation of this calamity for covenant infractions.

Nonetheless, Amos left his readers with a message of hope. He writes, *In that day I will raise up the booth of David that is fallen and repair its breaches, and raise up its ruins and rebuild it as in the days of old, that they may possess the remnant of Edom and all the nations who are called by my name,” declares the Lord who does this.*

May the LORD’s promise of restoration be our hope. May our hope in the Gospel become hope for those who are the most needy among us. As Paul writes, *And hope does not put us to shame, because God’s love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us* (Romans 5:5).

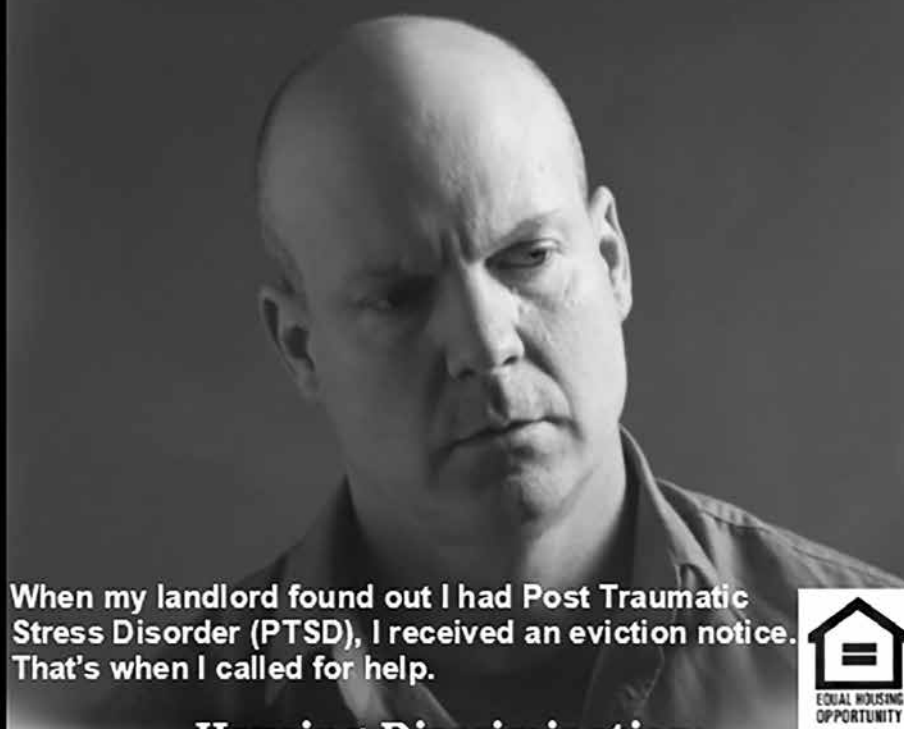

Working to End Veteran Homelessness

West Tennessee Legal Services (WTLS’) Executive Director, Cathy Clayton, joined Congresswoman Marsha Blackburn and other local, state and federal (VA and HUD) representatives in celebrating the Jackson-West Tennessee Continuum of Care (CoC) achievement of effectively ending veteran homeless in our region. This goal, coordinated by Tennessee Homeless Solutions (THS) as the CoC’s lead agency, would not have been possible without the efforts of the entire community, including the Mayors’ Challenge to End Homeless which was represented at the celebration by Jackson Mayor Jerry Gist and Henderson County Mayor Eddie Bray. As the recipient of a VA Supportive Services for Veterans Families (SSVF) grant, WTLS works closely with it subgrantee, THS, in assisting very low-income veteran’s families transitioning into permanent housing.



Cathy Clayton spoke at the celebration, noting that “Homelessness is always a tragedy but is especially heart-breaking when a veteran’s service to our country contributed to the situation. According to a survey released by the VA in May 2018, four of the top 10 unmet needs for homeless veterans result from a lack of legal assistance. Unresolved legal issues often contribute to the cycle of poverty that keeps veterans in a homeless or threat of homelessness situation. Wrongful eviction or foreclosure may force residents from their homes, robbing them of a stable shelter. Outstanding warrants and fines can pile up beyond a person’s ability to pay, possibly leading to jail time. The ability to bring in money through a job can be hampered by the lack of a fixed address, and without a driver’s license, commuting to a job by other means can be a struggle. Navigating the disability benefits process and medical bills for disabled veterans can be overwhelming. WTLS, a non-partisan legal aid provider funded in part by the Legal Services Corporation, works with the CoC to help veterans with these types of problems affecting their basic needs for which there may be legal solutions.”

Time to Think About Year-End Investment Moves

We've still got a couple of months left in 2018, but it's not too soon to start thinking about some year-end investment moves that might benefit you. Here are a few possibilities (although not all will apply to your situation):

Add to your IRA. For the 2018 tax year, you can put up to \$5,500 into your traditional or Roth IRA (assuming you are eligible), or \$6,500 if you're 50 or older. If you haven't reached this limit, consider adding some money. You have until April 15, 2019, to contribute to your IRA for 2018, but why wait until the last minute?

Increase your 401(k) contributions. You already may be investing in your 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan, but you might be able to bump up your contributions for the rest of the year, if it's allowed. Of course, you should always put in enough to earn your employer's matching contribution, if one is offered.

Take your RMDs. If you are 70½ or older, you must start taking withdrawals – called required minimum distributions, or RMDs – from your traditional IRA and your 401(k) or similar retirement plan. Generally, you must take these RMDs by December 31 every year. But if you turned 70½ in 2018, you can wait until April 1, 2019, until you take your first RMD. However, you will then have to take a second RMD (the one for age 71) by December 31, 2019. Taking two RMDs in one year could give you an unexpectedly large taxable income for the year, possibly bumping you into a higher tax bracket and affecting the amount of your Social Security benefits subject to taxes. So, if you are considering delaying your first RMD, consult with your tax advisor.


Make changes in response to life events. In 2018, did you experience a major life event, such as a marriage, divorce or addition of a child? Or did you change jobs or retire? Any of these events could lead you to adjust your investment plans, so now may be the time to do so, possibly with the help of a financial professional.

Review your investment mix. At least once a year, it's a good idea to review your investment mix to ensure it's still suitable for your goals and risk tolerance. Sometimes, even without your taking any action, your portfolio might change in ways you hadn't expected. For example, suppose you wanted your portfolio to contain 60% stocks and 40% bonds and other investments. After a period of rising prices, though, the value of your stocks may have increased so much that they now occupy 65% of your portfolio – which means you may be taking on more risk than you had originally intended. Consequently, you may need to rebalance your portfolio to get back to your original 60% to 40% ratios. (Keep in mind that these figures are just for illustration; everyone's ideal portfolio mix will depend on their individual situations.)

These aren't the only year-end moves you may want to consider, but they can help you close out 2018 on a positive note. Plus, they can serve as a reminder that you need to be vigilant as you keep working toward your financial goals.
